

Sunday February the 22<sup>nd</sup> 1846 commences with pleasant weather the bark standing to the Eastward at 4 P.M. spoke the brig <sup>666</sup> Mattapoissett of Mattapoissett Brightman 18 mo<sup>2</sup> the oot 200 sperm at 5 M spoke the Brig Inga again at 10 P.M. parted company at 6 A.M. steered of S.W. by W under all sail at 8 started W.S.W. at meridian luffed to the wind to the West the Inga in sight Lat 39°16 Long 49°11

MATTAPOISSETT

Monday February the 23<sup>rd</sup> commences with cloudy weather the bark standing to the Westward at 2 P.M. took in the light sails the wind from the N.W. at 4 P.M. spoke the brig Inga at sunset shortened sail for the night daylight brisk breeze and a heavy swell running at 6 A.M. steered of W.S.W. at 11 A.M. spoke the brig Inga again got some wood from her and let her have two casks of bread then wore ship to the Eastward Lat 39°15 Lon

INGA

Tuesday February the 24<sup>th</sup> commences with fresh gales & heavy swell from the north the bark standing to the Eastward at 4 P.M. spoke the brig Inga again and enough I should think at sunset shortened sail for the night at 7 P.M. rainy wore ship to the West middle and latter the same Lat 39°11

Wednesday February the 25<sup>th</sup> commences with fresh gales from the southward the bark lying to under her storm sails the weather clearing saw this day several schools of porpoise and a number of birds middle and latter parts the same Lat 39°00

Thursday Feb the 26<sup>th</sup> 1846 commences with fresh gales and cloudy with a heavy swell a running the bark standing to the S.W. under her storm sails at 3 P.M. more moderate set the fore course and let one reef out on the main topsail at 4 P.M. saw a sail to the S.W. middle part more moderate latter part a fanning breeze from the Westward and the bark standing to the Southward one sail in sight Latitude 38°38 Longitude 49°35 west

Friday February the 27<sup>th</sup> 1846 commences with strong winds and squally the bark heading to the South at 2 P.M. double reefed and took in the main sail & steered S by East saw a sail to leeward at sunset shortened sail for the night it blowing heavy middle and latter part much the same one sail in sight

Lat 38°47 Long 49°24

Saturday February the 28<sup>th</sup> commences with fresh gales and cloudy the bark standing to the South saw a bark of the weather standing to the South sunset more moderate middle part wore ship to the N.W. daylight a light breeze and a heavy swell one sail in sight at 7 P.M. steered off S.E. at noon luffed up South

SUNDAY MARCH the 1<sup>st</sup> 1846 commences with thick weather the Bark standing to the South at 5 P.M. wore ship at 4 P.M. set in rainy at 6 past 4 P.M. spoke the Bark OSCAR of Sag Harbor middle part moderate and some thunder latter part steered of S.E. Lat 38°07 Lon 48°47
