

Tuesday March the 10th 1846 commences with light winds the bark standing to the N^W at sunset slipped to the wind and shortened sail for the night daylight made all sail at 10 A.M. saw a large sperm whale of the lea bow dist 5 miles lowered all 3 boats in pursuit lat $38^{\circ}04'$

Wednesday March the 11th commences with fine pleasant weather the boats still in pursuit of the desired fish at 3 P.M. lost sight of the ship at 5 P.M. having a chance struck and killed a large sperm whale at  part 5 the starboard boat started at 7 P.M. saw a light dist 12 miles at 6 part 9 got alongside of the old bark again the 2 starboard boats still out of sight of the ship fast to the good old fish carried sail through the night at 7 A.M. caught sight of the boats of the weather beam dist 5 miles lowered the starboard boat and carried some refreshments for the men at 10 A.M. got the whale alongside and commenced cutting lat $38^{\circ}02'$ long $46^{\circ}03'$

Thursday March the 12th commences with fine pleasant weather all hands employed in cutting in at 5 P.M. spoke the Bark Cherokee Debolt of N^Y for New Bedford with 2600 oil at sunset looked down for the night daylight hooked on and commenced cutting and cut till noon so ends saw a sail of our landward supposed the Mattapirsetto lat $38^{\circ}04'$

Friday = March the 13th 1846 Commences with fine pleasant weather the Bsk heading to the North at 2 P.M. got the case baled and preparations made for Boiling at 6 part 3 commenced Boiling the head at daylight commenced boiling the Body at 8 A.M. saw a sail supposed to be a merchantman  middle & latter a fresh breeze from the N^E and the bark heading to the North all hands employed in boiling at 10 A.M. finished boiling and sent 1 watch below next day lat $38^{\circ}32'$ lon $45^{\circ}55'$

Saturday March the 14th commences with a fresh breeze from the North and the bark heading to the West all hands employed in boiling at 10 A.M. finished boiling and sent 1 watch below at 11 commenced breaking out to run down so ends lat $38^{\circ}12'$ long $45^{\circ}51'$

Sunday March the 15th commences with a fresh breeze at 2 P.M. began to run down the head at 5 P.M. put work middle part fresh gales from the N^E and the bark heading to the West at daylight got the main course saw nothing lat $38^{\circ}44'$ long $45^{\circ}51'$

Monday March 16th 1846 commences with fresh gales from the N^E and the bark heading west at sunset wore ship to the N^E daylight fresh gales from the N^E the bark heading to the N^E at 7 A.M. commenced running down at meridian got dinner Latitude $38^{\circ}12'$ Longitude $44^{\circ}44'$
