

Friday the 4th September the 4 Day of the Year 1829. These 24 hours Commenced With the watch employed in Ships duty and fresh breezes from the S. W. by S. at 6 Pm knock off work & L. and middle parts fresh breezes from the S. W. and cloudy thick weather & L. at half past 7 Am the watch Cawled & employed in Ships Duty and the weather much the same as the middle and latter light breezes from S. W. by S. and at 10 Pm by Clock 15:37 North and Long in 21:50 West & L.

Saturday September the 5 Day these 24 hours Commenced With light winds & pleasant weather and winds from S. W. by S. and the watch in duty in Ships Duty. Making a flying Gibb and Sun making sail at 6 Pm knock off work & L. and middle parts light breezes from S. S. W. at 6 Am took Ship & stood to the west & two sail insight to the Eastward of us & at half past 7 Am the watch cawled and employed in Ships Duty making flying Gibb and light winds from the South & pleasant weather & L. and latter parts light winds and pleasant weather and at 10 Pm by Clock 15:17 North and Long in 21:03 West and Sound these 24 hours

Sunday the 6 Day of September these 24 hours Commenced With light winds from the South & the watch employed in Ships Duty & L. at 6 Pm knock off work & light winds from the South & pleasant weather & L. a sail insight & L. and a man on board at 6 Pm knock off work at 8 Pm took Ship and stood the South and East & L. and middle parts light winds from the S. W. and pleasant weather & L. at half past 7 the watch cawled and a sail insight to the South and East & L. and the new fly Gibb and all hands employed in the South and latter parts light winds from the W. S. W. and pleasant weather and at 10 Pm by Clock 15:54 North and Long in 20:12 West and Sound

Monday September the 7 Day first parts of these 24 hours Commenced with light winds from the W. S. W. & L. at 6 Pm light winds from the S. W. & L. at half past 7 Pm a shower of rain & squally at 10 Pm fired the royal & fly Gibb and the topgallants as is & L. at 2 Am took the topgallant Sails & fly Gibb & L. at half past 7 Am the watch cawled and employed in Ships Duty and cloudy thick weather and light winds from the S. W. & L. and latter parts fresh breezes from S. W. by W. and No Clock this Day but by Tide

Reckoning we are in 14:00 North Lat. and Long in 19:00 West Long in and Sound these 24 hours & L. & L.

Tuesday September the 8 Day these 24 hours Commenced With squally rainy weather and winds from the S. W. by W. & L. at 6 Pm killed a sheep and rainy and thick cloudy & L. at 6 Pm pleasant and knock off work & L. and middle parts fresh breezes from the S. W. and at half past 7 Am the watch cawled and employed in Ships Duty at 8 Am took Ship and stood the W. W. and S. and these 24 hours with strong breezes the South & L. at 10 Pm by Clock 15:28 North and Long in 18:00 West

Wednesday the 9 Day of September these 24 hours Commenced With the watch employed in Ships duty and strong winds from the South & L. at 6 Pm knock off work & L. winds as before and middle parts pleasant and winds from the S. S. W. and with our Larchard tacks on board at half past 7 Am the watch cawled and employed in Ships Duty and winds from S. W. and a strong sail in sight two points on our lee bow standing to the eastward & L. and middle parts pleasant weather and at 10 Pm by Clock 15:58 North and Long in 18:55 West and Sound these 24 hours

Thursday the 10 Day of September these 24 hours Commenced With good breeze from the South & our Larchard tack on board and the watch employed in Ships Duty & L. at 6 Pm knock off work and pleasant weather and middle parts fresh breezes from S. W. by East and all sail set & L. at half past 7 Am the watch cawled & employed in Ships Duty & L. and latter parts of these 24 hours fresh breezes from the S. S. E. and at 10 Pm by Clock 15:49 North and Long in 19:45 West Long in & L.

Friday the 11 Day of September these 24 hours Commenced with fresh breezes from S. S. E. and the watch employed in Ships Duty and all sail set & L. at 6 Pm knock off work & L. at 6 Pm by S. and middle parts strong breezes from the S. E. & L. at half past 7 Am the watch cawled and employed in Ships Duty and strong breezes from the S. E. Concluded at the trade winds & L. and latter parts of these 24 hours strong breezes from the S. E. & L. at 10 Pm by Clock 15:02 North & Long in 20:07 West
