wind Calms out to the S. S. W. Steering East the Same Course.
We saw some Blackfish, but we did not get them. we
He set the Studding Sails all hands Employing in Potting yards
and Spining. Spun yarn at 5 p m we saw some More Black fish
we Load the Boats but off but had not Struck?

Middle part fine breeze and pleasant the wind is to the
Southward and westward.

Latter part the wind and weather is about the Same.

we saw some Blackfish we caught one and we saw the Spot of
A whale for several times he went down and we saw him no

Duty Nothing Remarkable this 24 hours So Ends.

Remarks on Board Saturday July 24th 1830

These 24 hours continues with Strong Breezes and thick weather turning
to the Eastward at 4 P m. it commenced with Showers of Rain and some
Thunder and Lightning at 11 p m. the wind hauls to the Northward

Middle part Light Breeze and squally, the weather look bad we
took in the Light Sails and kept the top Sails.

Latter part More Pleasant we Made a Sail to the windward we
Swearing Close by the wind to the Southward and Eastward Nothing ^{was} in sight.

Remarks on Board Sunday July 25th 1830

These 24 hours continues with a Moderate Breeze and thick weather
the wind is to Eastward at 1 P m we tacked to the Northward and a little
earlier all hands Employing in fitting the Rigging and Sundry?

Middle part Strong Breeze and squally weather we took in the topsail
Gallant Sail and Single kept the top Sail?

Latter part the wind started to the Southward with a Strong Gale at 9 a m. we
lost both the topsail it came on very thick and plenty of rain at 10 a m.
The wind hauling Round to the W. S. W. So Ends with a Strong Breeze and plenty
of rain.
