Remarks on Board Thursday 19th 1830

This 24 hours Begins with a calm the boats on Shore for the last time at 4 p M. the boats came off and we had for the Banks.

Middle part the Same

Latter part Light breeze Spring up from the East and Strong to the South So Ends

Remarks on Board Friday August 20th 1830

This 24 hours continues with a fine breeze and pleasant weather the wind to the Eastward all the Ships have started from the Banks

Middle part Light air and Calm pleasant

Latter part Ends the Same the Land is not fair off all hands Employing in paying the Ships hands fitting the cutting penants Stowing the goods on the Rail and the other inboard to make room

Remarks on Board Saturday August 21st 1830

This 24 hours Begins with a calm Employing in Ships duty at 2 p M. we saw some Blackfish or Scaud Boats but did not strike too fast came on board

Middle part Calm and pleasant weather

Latter part Light air from the Northward Strong at 10 A M. the South End of Long Bore S. by E Dist 14 Leagues from which is taken my departure from it Lying in the Lat 44, 50 N Long 24, 43, W
Left by Obs 14, 07, North

Remarks on Board Sunday August 22nd 1830

This 24 hours Begins with a calm ten whole lat in Light the watch in fishing and speking the new boats &

Middle part Light and calm

Latter part about the Same the Narrator Barque in Monday in Company we have Light puff of wind So Ends

Remarks on Board Monday August 23rd 1830

This 24 hours continues with a calm and puff of wind now and then Strong Sby W what little we go what air there is it is from the Northward

Middle part Calm at 3 p M. we had a Light breeze at daylight there was 7 Ships and one Brig in Sight Some of them is Merchants Vessels and Export

Latter part about the Same Employing in fitting the new Boats painting them and Sundry Jobs

Remarks on Board Tuesday August 24th 1830

This 24 hours Begins with a Light air and calm the watch Employ in Sundry Jobs the Cooper commenced Making up the old Slaves into Ribs and Small Casks

Middle part Light air and Cloudy weather Light squalls of Rain at daylight there was 4 Sail in Sight whole Ships and Merchants Ships

Latter part Ends about the Same Employing in Ships Duty
