

Remarks on Board Tuesday August 31st 1830

This 24 hours continues with a Moderate Breeze some Squalls Sprung Sharp by the wind to the Southward and Eastward the wind about 1 P.M. at 4 P.M. We passed by a long Sailing to westward

Middle part Light Breeze and pleasant weather at 7 A.M. Sailed Ship to the westward on Sail in Light to the Starboard

Latter part about the same all hands Employing in knocking yarns Making Spungarn &c

Lat 63° 10' North Long 19° 12' West

Remarks on Board Wednesday September 1st 1830

This 24 hours about the same the wind varies and falls some at 1 P.M. we took Ship to the S by S Nothing in Sight all hands Employing in Making & Lashings and Spungarn Sundry Jobs at 5 P.M. we took in the old gutters Boats and put out the old ones

Middle part Light Breeze and Pleasant weather

Latter part all hands Employing in Setting up the fore and Main rigging Reapling New Lannard and S

Lat 63° 19' North Long 16° 53' West

Remarks on Board Tuesday September 2nd 1830

This 24 hours continues with a light breeze and pleasant weather all hands Employing in Setting up the Rigging at 5 P.M. we saw a School of Blackfish in Sward but did not strike they were too shy at 8 P.M. we took to the South

Middle part Light breeze and pleasant weather

Latter part about the same all hands Employing in Setting up the Rigging and Mating the yards Making Spungarn

Lat 63° 26' North

Ship Emerald off New Bedford Bound on a Whaling Voyage to the Tristan Island (Mentor) Master James A. Horton

Remarks on Board Friday Sept 3rd 1830

This 24 hours continues with a Light breeze and pleasant weather all hands Employing in Ships Duty Nothing in Sight

Middle part fine breeze and Pleasant weather

Latter part the wind and weather about the same all hands Employing in Ships Duty the Cooper and Carpenter & Blacksmiths work at their trades

Lat 63° 55' North

Remarks on Board Saturday Sept 4th 1830

This 24 hours continues with a Light breeze and Pleasant weather all hands Employing in Ships Duty the work must be done before the weather comes on

Middle part wind and weather much the same Ship still Standing to the Westward

Latter part as above with Clear Pleasant weather

Lat 63° 11' North Long 13° 18' West

Remarks on Board Sunday Sept 5th 1830

This 24 hours commences with a Smart breeze from the Southward the Ship by the wind to the westward with all Pable Sail out to Gaze to the Southward the watch Employing in Ships Duty

Middle part Light breeze and pleasant weather

Latter part fine breeze and pleasant weather at 10 A.M. saw a School of Spum whales 2 parts of the Sea bow at 11 A.M. saw the boats and went a Long Side of the Whales but did not strike them I catch this 24 hours No other the Day
