four top Gallant Rigging and Rattlings and 2 Saw a Spout of A
few Boats several times To Ends With a Calm

Remarks on Board Sunday Sept 19th 1830
Lat 19. 06 South

This 24 hours commences With a Calm all Hands Employing to Work
on the Whigging Lifting up the Stays the Cooper and Carpenter
and Blacksmith Boat-biller and Painter all at Work at their
trades & at 10 A.M. Light Breeze Sprung up from the S.W. Steering by the wind
to the Eastward.

Middle Part Squally Weather the wind all Round the
Compass

Latter part the Wind held to the S.E. some

Remarks on Board Monday Sept 20th 1830

The first part of these 24 hours commences With Light Breeze from the Eastward
with some Squalls of Rain the Ship by the wind to the Southward with all
possible Sails out, Saw a Spout of a firework and some porpoises &c

Latter part I Much the same the Ship by the Wind to S.W. the
watch Employing in Ship's duty at 10 P.M. I passed by a large Starling to
the Eastward To Ends this 24 hours

Remarks on Board Tuesday Sept 21st 1830

This 24 hours Commences With a Light Breeze from the Southward and
Eastward the Ship by the Wind to the S.W. we saw 2 porpoises the watch
Employing as usual

Latter part had Wind and Light we killed the Porpoise that was
Gut to the S. land Employing in Making Lanes Whorps and Small
wriggers at 11 A.M. took Ship to the Eastward Employing in various
Sails To Ends this 24 Lat 19. 25 South Long 31. 51. 30 W

Remarks on Board Wednesday Sept 22nd 1830

This 24 hours Commences a Light Breeze 1 P.M. the Wind Started to
to the Eastward We took Ship to the S.W. again the wind still
a head and Light

Whorps and We took all our Sails on Deck and took over half them
and to see what they were Bent our fore and Main topsails We saw
two Hump Backs and some porpoises To Ends these 24 hours with a Light

S.E. all Hands Employing in Repairing the four top Sails
Saw one few Boats To Ends
