This 21 hours Commences With a Light Breeze and pleasant Weather
all hands Employing in Repairing the old Main top Sail Saw a few
Bark & 2

Middle part Light puff of Wind and Calm

Latter part Light Breeze from the N East the Ship Steaming to the
S. E. With all Sails out. We Saw the Sea some fisherboats &
the Watch Employing in Storing the Spars over the Stern. Ends this 21
hours With a calm. Lat 22. 15 S. Long 70. 15 W.

Remarks on Board Saturday Sept 22nd 1830

This 22 hours Commences With a Light Breeze and Pleasant Weather the Carpenter
is making a fore top Gallant Sloop Spring then all our navy had most off
Employing in setting up a fore top Gallant Mast stays and Lundry Sails.

Middle part Calm

Latter part Light Breeze and pleasant weather unbent the fore top
Gallant Sails and yard the Watch Employing in Repairing the
fore top Gallant Sails. Ends this 22 hours

Lat 22. 37 S. Long 70. 37 W.

Remarks on Board Sunday Sept 23rd

This 23 hours Commences With a Light Breeze and pleasant Weather
We bent the Main top Gallant Sails and bent the Fore top Gallant
yard up and bent the Sails and the Rigging. Saw two Fishboats.

Middle part fine breeze and pleasant Weather

Latter part Begins Smart Breeze and pleasant Weather from the
East the Ship is a Steaming S. E. With all Sails Set to
the best advantage. Sudden Sails Set a low and a Left Sails.

Remarks on Board Monday Sept 24th 1830

This 24 hours Commences With a Strong Breeze from the North Steaming
S. E. With all Sails out the Weather looks heavy and
Cloudy at 6 P. M. took in the Light Sails.

Middle part Strong Wind and of Squally Weather with heavy Rains
and thick Thunder and Lightning very heavy at 3 P. M. the Wind fresh so
fast that We dolly took the fore and Main top Sails and furl
the Main top Sail at 5 P. M. the Wind hauled to the S. W. and with
a plenty of Rain, at 8 P. M. the Wind died away and Made Sail, again. &

Latter part the Wind about North again the Wind Moderates. Lat 25. 41 S. Long 72. 41 W.

Remarks on Board Tuesday Sept 25th 1830

This 25 hours Continues With a Strong Breeze from the North
and thick Weather With some Squalls of Rain the Ship Steaming
S. E. the Ship under all Sails that is required. Saw a few back the Watch
Employing in Ship Duty.

Middle part With a Moderate Breeze and pleasant Weather. Lat 26. 51 S. Long 73. 51 W.

Latter part the Same Employing in fitting the fore and
blocks a left the Carpenter and Blacksmith and Cooper is all at
Work at these trades. Ends this 26 hours the wind hauled to the westward.
Lat 27. 55 S. Long 74. 55 W.
