

¹⁰ Thursday 5 Sept 1833 All those 24 hours squally weather Lay to those 24 hours

Friday 6 Sept 1833 Those 24 begin with light winds all hands employed in stowing down Oil saw 2 Ships off the lee quarter

Saturday 7 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin with heavy winds at 6 A.M. Reefed top Sails at 12 A.M. Wore ship Lay to all those 24 hours

Sunday 8 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin heavy gales at 8 A.M. Parted the main top Sail Lay to all those 24 hours saw right Whales

Monday 9 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin with strong breezes latter part moderate at 4 P.M. saw a right Whale and lowered after him did not get fast

Tuesday 10 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin with pleasant gales latter part squally at 11 A.M. spoke the ship South Carolina Capt Marfield

Wednesday 11 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours heavy gales and rainy ship South Carolina off the lee beam Lay to all those 24 hours under close reefed main top sail

Thursday 12 Sept 1833 All those 24 hours Lay to under close reefed main top sail at 2 P.M. wore ship at 4 P.M. saw a ship off the weather beam so ends those 24 hours

Thursday 13 Sept 1833 Those 24 begin with light breezes at 9 A.M. spoke ship Neptune of New London with 1 Spearmark and 1 Right Whale at 2 P.M. lowered over boats for Right Whales did not get fast

Saturday 14 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours Pleasant gales at 9 A.M. struck a Right Whale and the line parted so ends those 24 hours

Sunday 15 Sept 1833 All those 24 hours light winds and cloudy weather at 10 A.M. saw ship South Carolina (Marfield) with her boats fast to a Whale spouting blood at 11 A.M. saw a ship off our lee bow so ends those 24 hours

Monday 16 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin with heavy gales middle and latter part the same Lay to all those 24 hours

Tuesday 17 Sept 1833 Those 24 hours begin with strong breezes middle and latter part the same

Wednesday Sept 18-1833 Those 24 hours begin with light winds at 10 A.M. saw a ship off the lee beam at 2 P.M. lowered away for right Whales did not get fast so ends those 24 hours

Thursday Sept 19th 1833 Those 24 hours pleasant weather at 2 P.M. went on shore at tristan de Cunha at 4 P.M. spoke ship John of New Bedford with 2 Whales saw 3 more ships boiling oil
