Sunday June 22^d 1834 At 5 A.M. sailed from the
Harbour of New Bedford for the South Atlantic Ocean
On a whaling voyage with a south west wind and
Pleasant weather at 9 P.M. Left our Pilot so ends those
24 hours

Monday June 23^d 1834 Those 24 hours pleasant N W Breeses
and clear weather at 6 A.M. Killed a young fish at 12 P.M.
Killed a sunfish All hands employed in ships duty so ends those
24 hours

Tuesday June 24th pleasant weather and N W winds all
Hands employed in ships duty so ends those 24 hours

Wednesday 25th June Those 24 hours strong N by E Breeses
This day saw 2 Ships standing Eastward so ends those 24 hours

Thursday 26th June Those 24 hours begin with strong breezes
And thick weather so ends those 24 hours

Friday 27th June Those 24 hours heavy gales of wind from
the westward this day saw 1 Ship and brig standing eastward
so ends those 24 hours

Saturday 28 June Those 24 hours N W Winds and pleasant
Weather saw a brig standing Westward so ends those 24 hours

Sunday 29 June This day begin with N E by S Winds and
Clear weather at 12 o'clock reefed fore and main top sail
so ends those 24 hours

Monday 30 June 1834 Those 24 hours heavy gales of wind
And rainy this Day ran under closed reefed top sails
saw a Brig to leeward so ends those 24 hours

Tuesday July 1st 1834 Those 24 hours commences with Easterly
Winds latter part calm saw a school of Black fish so
ends those 24 hours

Wednesday July 2^d 1834 Those 24 hours N W Winds at 9
A.M. Saw 2 Ships to windward all hands employed in
Ships duty so ends those 24 hours
