The 24 hours commences equally the wind S. W.
Sailing to the S. and E. and a fair set took in sail.
For the night several of the bottom were ship to the
Van. The next Day with a light N. breeze made sail.
The breeze with these 24 hours the watch is employed at

W. Higgins Duty. So ended this Day.
Remarks the same. Fine Day March the 23rd 1851
These 22 hours commencing with a calm the watch is
employed at ship's duty, not a sunset took in sail. For
the night, not a breeze till 10 o'clock, when a fair
W. N. E. light breeze to the S. W. steering to the
S. W. N. and by 10 o'clock took in all the light
sails. So ended this Day

Remarked On Board Whales Day March 26th
 No. 29 hours commenced with 9 more boats
 Brought from the M. W. steering S. on W. and
 W. from said 3 sail at sunset took in sail for
 the night sound 20 fathoms at day light
 Called for M. Anson mid sail now took 3 ship
 W. from 11 hrs sound 20 fathoms
 So ended this day

Remarks Mr. Board. Thurs Day March 27th
Breeze began to blow with N. E. breeze to the
N. W. according to Mrs. S. sun. The wind at sunset
blew in sail for the night more ships are sound
got 3rd for the more at Day late called all hands
Miss David at 4. Our hooked ship the latter
the strong breeze so ends this Day

Remarks Mr. Board B. Dry March 25th 1848
These 24 hours commenced with a strong breeze
from the E. S. E. blowing to the N. W. but at 4
the tide in all the little coves at sunset the
E. wind gave the night and succeeded by
calmness at day light in the S. W. breeze
and succeeded by a gale of wind at 10 A.M. it began
to rain so hard this day
