Remarks On Board "Hunt" Day July 24th Dec. 1851
 @ 11.24 hours commenced since the wind S. E. strong.
 W. H. W. the Land about 40 f. M. return a sail. W.
 storm strong. W. H. W. at 2 pm. Report two sails
 back and 6 miles the barque "Benjamin" twelve. At
 New Bedford Capt. Abner gave 30 fathoms at
 sunset in sail. For the night at Day light called all.
 Hunt made sail two sails in at St George's price in sight
 to under this Day

Remarks from Board of the Day August the 1st 1851
Breeze & waves continues from the wind S. E. Steady
Clear the M. M. were out of from Benjamin twelve or
Down and down. Weather good. At noon saw 20

Board at day light with 100 lbs. of iron and 3 seals in

Remarks On Board "Thurs. Day, August 7th, 1851
These 24 hours commenced early, the night is on shore
of turning out of port about 4. An ion squall, all hands
employed at ships duty until 9 pm the next morn. 4
Boat Board 3rd barrels of potatoes stored 3rd & 4th
Two hills of sheep at sunset took in sail for
the night at 7 pm light calld all hands and
the signal sail, two courses of the forenoon
off started at 8. Strong breeze with these
24 hours so ended this day.
