and with much overcast
cheerfully employed

N.W. course S.E. & E sent up and
set main & mizzen all low stinging
sails

Middle and late fine winds
from N.W. employed in scraping
and drying boards

Friday 29 Fine winds from
N.W. course S.E. & E employed in
scraping and drying boards

Lat 42° 15' Long 166° 44' West

Saturday 30 Strong winds from
N.W. course S.E. & E
Middle & later much the same

Lat 38° 10' Long 164° 10'

Sunday 1. Not strong winds from
N.W. course S.E. & E employed in
scraping and drying boards

Lat 35° 48' Long 162° 31'

Oct 2

Wednesday 9. This day have taken
the N.E. trade as it appears
strongly from course N.E. & E
Lat 33° 47'

from E & S and from the N.W. trade winds

Thursday 8. Strong winds from
E and squalls of rain ship
about to be at 4 P.M. speak ship
Benjamin Morgan of N. London
all full

The weather has been better for
the last week the winds principally
from the East & thick mairing and
muzzled them in a stiff sea
carrying now barrel in

My Lat is 25° 40' and Long 157° 25'

Friday 14. Winds from E
and has been that for the last
4 days. I find hard work to quit
to the eastward but I must go
there soon now or after fine weather
finishes all the lower on board
employed & quarantined the Cooper
employed in setting up pipes for
water the Cooper employed
in making Mizzen top garden for
etc.
