

Remarks On board Ship Erie of Fairhaven

Saturday July 3^d A.D. 1852

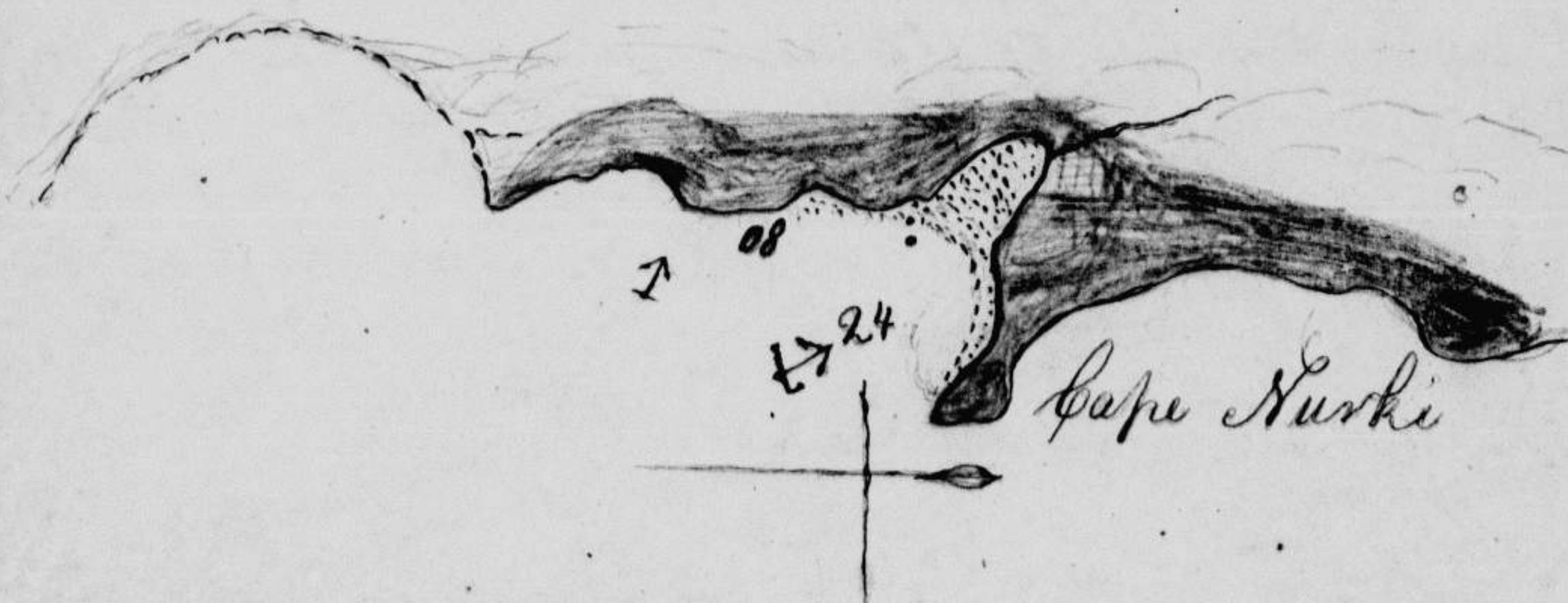
First part light breeze at E. & clear ship heading by the wind to the N. - saw nothing Middle part light breeze at N.E. wind ship head by the wind all sails set. Saw the land to the leeward coast a carcass all hands empty in stowing oil in the After Hatch thus Ends this day

Sunday July 4th 1852

First part light breeze and pleasant all hands empty in stowing oil. spoke Ship Alert. of N. Longm. & while this season Capt. G. went on board for a few minutes the Spaulding sight to leeward Middle part ship by of from the land light part light breeze at 7 A.M. sent 3 boats in shore Cape Naki Dist 12 miles at 3 P.M. the Alert & life to the land saw them struck a whale thus Ends this day

Monday May July 5th 1852

First part light air at N. ship working up to the land at 2 P.M. the Power boat came a long side & struck and killed the whale left it with the other boats got the Wedge anchor on to bow and at 4 P.M. came too on anchor in 2 to 3 fms water took the whale along side and hooked on and cut him finished at 4 A.M. while those at home are celebrating this day we are getting a whale. latter part light air wind at N. got under way and went about along to land 2 miles and came to in 2 1/2 fms water



while cruising in Sea of Beholst. July 1852

Tuesday July 6th 1852

First part Ship at anchor Cape Naki leaving N.W. 3 miles dist at 1 P.M. sent 3 boats to look for whale in shore the Waist boat struck and turned the whale up 1 mile from the Ship outside by at intervals at 6 P.M. towards the whale to the Ship hooked on and cut him finished at 11 P.M. sent all boats latter part at 5 A.M. cleared up the decks and at 9 the fog lights up sent 3 boats to the Cape a most tremendous current set South 12 hours and N. 12 the path of the Ship is

Wednesday July 7th 1852

First part light breeze and pleasant the Ship at anchor at 6 P.M. the boats came on board without success had landed at an Indian village at the head of the bay got some Salmon at 8 A.M. the fog commenced boiling the boats empty in boiling

Thursday July 8th 1852

First part thick fog the Ship at anchor at 4 fog lights sent 3 boats in shore these on board empty boiling 4 P.M. the boats came on board had seen a whale could not get on Middle part 1 boat crews empty in boiling at 7 A.M. sent 2 boats in shore these on board empty in boiling and stowing oil clear weather the Alert to the land had took 2 whale here thus Ends this day

Friday July 9th 1852

First part light air and pleasant at 5 P.M. the boats came on board without success the others empty in stowing oil and boiling Middle part a boat crews empty in boiling latter part at 8 A.M. sent 2 boats in shore the others empty in stowing oil and boiling thus Ends this day finished boiling from one of our fog pots which stored 130 lbs. 14 gallons.
