Commenced fresh again the 24th M. heading to the
latter part of the day. I had a walk
below the fore room as I stood watch last night
during the fore noon with our watch & saw in
salt water a ballad. At 11:00 A.M. I came on deck and
saw the harp. At the time of

Wednesday April 6th / 70

119 Weeks from May Wednesday April 6th /76
 Light Mac (Commenced stowing from the - & W heading
 old deck U. at 9 A.M. close studds M.T. sail and started the
 for sail. Looking at the wounded whale, W. A.
 was kept aloft - this afternoon his watch below.

Thursday April 11

A strong gale of wind from the S.W. has prevailed here at 8 A.M. your winged air. at 9 A.M. seen heading to the N.W. It on deck for our ship.

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Friday April 8th 1870

Commenced with a moderate gale from the WSW during the day, under two close reefed topsails & foremast heading to the S. at 4 PM wind about W. N. E. In the afternoon 12, 40 S.W. to S. S. W. freshening.

Saturday April 9th/10

Commenced staving from the W. M. heading to the
S.W. at 12.30 till noon ship heading N.W. at 4.00.
staving N.W. & gradually in. till about all the
forenoon. All hostilities would be right between 4.00

Sunday April 10th / 70

Commenced underway from the S.W. at a full
main sail steering by the wind heading about
N.W. all sail set. Latitude 5 Deg 14

Monday April 14. P. 10

Commenced with a light air from the S.W. steering a bow S.W. about 8.30 A.M. the winter raised a sperm whale one right on the bow bow lowered all four boats. the whaler started & quick to windward. the whaler went out of sight to windward at 11.30 but sight of them from the boat came along side at 3 P.M. at 5 M. the whaler raised a sperm whale going to the W. lowered all four boats. but so near dark saw them for one rising. they showed a good shape I think had there been a regular daylight. The first whaler was going a bow S.W. or S.E. and about a dozen or them. Mr Hall called them ^{one} cows but I call them 60 or 70 barrel bulls & I should not be surprised if some of them was a hundred barrel whaler as timber whaler is very deceiving.
