

Remarks On Board Brig E. H. Adams.

Sunday April 23rd 1876

Begins with strong trades a rough sea big by the wind to the S.E. the Havel in sight astern & the Louisa off lee quarter. at sundown took in fore & main sail & set to 4 sail. weather squally. middle & latter parts fresh trades a rough sea at daylight were ship to N.E. saw 1 sail so ends
Lat 12° 58' N Long 41° 58' W.

Monday April 24th

Begins with fresh trades a rough sea at 12° 15' spoke brig D. A. Small. Burren 15 months out with 3800. Went on board of her at 4 P.M. the Spontan Capt. Trippe came down to us & Capt. I came on board of the ~~Small~~ at 7 P.M. I came on board. big by the wind to S.E. middle & latter parts more moderate at daylight were ship to N. saw 3 sails so ends this day
Lat 12° 54' N Long 42° 00' W.

Tuesday April 25th

Begins with fresh trades a rough sea big by the wind to N.E. 2 sail in sight; middle & latter parts more moderate but empty big by the wind heading from N to N.E. by N saw nothing so ends

Lat 14° 04' N Long 42° 20' W.

Cruising On Thelre Forty Grounds

Wednesday April 26th 1876

Begins with quite moderate trades. Smith atmosphere tacked ship to S.E. at 4 P.M. saw the Lancer at sundown saw the Janet. also saw the brig D. A. Small. middle & latter parts wind & weather much the same at daylight tacked ship to the N.E. saw the Small to windward so ends
Lat 13° 53' N Long 41° 58' W.

Thursday April 27th

Begins with moderate trades big by the wind heading N.E. & N.E. by N. saw one merchant brig steering N.W. middle part much the same latter part fresh breezes at daylight tacked ship to S.E. at 10 A.M. raised a school of small sperm whales 1 point off lee bow going to windward. at 12 N lowered 2 blacked boats & made chase at 1 P.M. the waigh boat struck then lowered S.B. the L.B. soon struck. the S.B. got stuck the N & L Boats got me & each got them alongside at 4 P.M. on

Friday April 28th

At 4:45 P.M. hooked on to the Leagest whale a 8:15 had them both on deck got supper at 9 P.M. braced forward & made some sail & set the watches. middle & latter parts fine weather at daylight were ship to S.E. all hands employed cutting Rubber Boiling &c. saw one whale bark so ends
Lat 14° 12' N Long 41° 44' W.
