Wednesday June 23rd

This twenty four hours commences with light breeze from E.N.E. and good weather headed to S.E. Through the night the same At 1 A.M. tack ship headed to the Northward Latter part the same so ends

Thursday June 24th

This twenty four hours commences with light breeze from E.N.E. and good weather headed N.W. & At sun down tack ship headed S.E. by E ½ E under of all sails Through the night headed E Latter part E.N.E. so ends.

Lat 35°09 Long 39°50

Friday June 25th

This twenty four hours commences with light breeze from N.N.E. and fine weather headed to the Eastward At 5 ½ p.m. lowered for black fish L Boat got one through the night headed N.N.W. At day light tack ship headed S.E. by E Latter part of the day headed to the Eastward with light air employed in musing the blubber so ends

Saturday June 26th

This twenty four hours commences with light air and calm headed to the Eastward At 4 ½ p.m. saw a lone sperm whale At 5 p.m. lowered the two larboard boats at 7 ½ p.m. L Boat got fast little while after-ward line parted at 9 p.m. boats came on board Through the night headed to Westward with light breeze Latter part set the sails saw two whalers so ends.

Sunday June 27th

This twenty four hours commences with light breeze from N.E. headed to the Southward At 4 p.m. spoke Bark Spartan Capt Brounell went on board of her At sun down furled the light sails At 9 p.m. Capt returned Through the night the same Latter part under of all sails headed to N.W. wind W.S.W. so ends

Lat 35°32 Long 40°22

Monday June 28th

This twenty four hours commences with fine breeze from Westward and fair weather headed N.N.W. At 3 p.m. steered N.E. At sun down short in sails and up to headed N.N.W. saw Spartan to the leeward Through the night the same Latter part strong breeze and squally steered S.E. so ends
