Saturday July 17th

This twenty four hours commences with light winds and calm headed E S E At sun down short in sails Through the night the same At day light set the sails At 11 A m spoke Bark Headlin 180 barrels sp. Capt Brounell went on board so ends.

Lat 35°44 Long 39°55

Sunday July 18th

This twenty four hours commences with light breeze from Southward and calm headed to the Eastward At sun down short in sails At 8 p m Capt returned Through the night the same At day light fine breeze set the sails saw 9 sails so ends.

Lat 35°58 Long 39°30

Monday July 19th

This twenty four hours commences with good breeze from Southward and good weather headed to the Eastward under all sails At sun down short in sails Through the night strong breeze from S S W Latter part strong wind and squally headed S E by S under of short sails so ends no obs. weather rainy.

Tuesday July 20th

This twenty four hours commences with strong breeze from S S W and rainy weather headed S E by S Middle and Latter part fresh gale from S W and squally under of short sails so ends.

Lat 35°15 Long 36°45

Wednesday July 21st

This twenty four hours commences with fresh gale from S W and squally weather steered E At 6 p m hup to headed S S E Through the night headed S Latter part wind hauled W S W wore ship headed N W by W At noon strong gale so ends.

Lat D R 35°20 Long 35°53

Thursday July 22nd

This twenty four hours commences with strong gale from W S W and squally weather headed to N W At 2 p m wind more moderate At 9 p m had squall from W N W wore ship headed S W Latter part better weather set the sails Employed in breaking out for water and provisions so ends.
