Remarks on board of Brig

Thursday July 6th
First part this twenty four hours fine breeze from Southward and good weather headed to Westward At 2 p m finish working employed in cleaning the deck Middle and Latter part squally so ends

Lat D R 31°35' Long 74°55'

Friday July 7th
This day commence with fine Southerly wind and cloudy weather employed in pumping the salt water and stow down the oil. Middle and Latter weather the same so ends.

Lat 30°34' Long 74°15'

Saturday July 8th
First part this twenty four hours fine breeze from Southward and good weather headed to N W At 5 p m spoke Sch Cohannet 2 months out clean Middle and Latter part weather the same so ends

Lat 31°33' Long 74°34'

Sunday July 9th
All this twenty four hours light breeze from N E and fair weather headed to the Northward saw one sail to the Westward so ends

Lat 31°55' Long 74°10'

Monday July 10th
All this twenty four hours light breeze and calm still cruising saw two sails hands employed in ship duty so ends

Lat 30°50' Long 74°36'

Tuesday July 11th
All this twenty four hours light air and calm headed to the northward spoke a merchant Sch E P Newcomb from West Indies bound to Boston saw two more sails so ends

Lat 32°08' Long 74°24'

Wednesday July 12th
All this twenty four hours light air from S W and calm weather headed to the Southward saw 5 sails so ends

Lat 31°58' Long 74°48'

Thursday July 13th
First part this twenty four hours light air from South West headed to the Southward Middle part the same Latter part steered E N E saw 2 sails so ends.

Lat 32°01' Long 73°36'

Friday July 14th Commence with light breeze from W S W steered N E at 1 p m saw whales going quick to the windward At 4 p m lowered the boats at 6 boats returned unsuccessful Middle and Latter part fine breeze still cruising so ends

Lat 31°33' Long 74°13'
