

Remarks on board of Brig

E H Adams Capt Brounell 1876

Sunday July 23rd

This twenty four hours commence with fine breeze from Southward and good weather headed to S E Middle part the same latter part strong breeze and squally steered N N E saw a sail to the Northward so ends

Lat 33°00 Long 73°00

Monday July 24th

This day commence with strong breeze from S W and squally weather spoke Bark Sarah of New Bedford on morning out she just got through cutting small whale. At 2 p m reef the top sail and short in sails wind increasing At 4 p m saw whales, the weather look bad did not lowered the boats At 6 p m double reef the top sail and furl the fore sail Through the night strong winds headed to the Southward Latter part was ship headed to the northward so ends

Lat 33°05 Long 72°48

Tuesday July 25th

This day commence with fresh gale from S W and cloudy weather headed to W N W Middle part squally headed to the Southward Latter part rainy so ends no obs

Wednesday July 26th

This day commence with fresh gale from S W and rain squalls headed W by N At 4 p m wore ship headed S Through the night squally and rainy Latter part light breeze and heavy sea so ends

Lat 33°30 Long 72°10

Thursday July 27th

This day commence with light winds and fine rain with heavy sea Through the night calm At 4 a m heard some whales spouting long side of the vessel At 7 a m lowered the boats At noon boats returned unsuccessful whales going to the northward wore ship headed to the westward so ends

Lat 33°00 Long 72°05

Friday July 28th

First part this day commence with fine breeze from Southward headed to Westward at 1 p m saw whales lowered the boats Le Boat dartsed at one did not get fast At 3 boats returned at 4 p m spoke Lieut Wm Willson Capt Bragley 4 months out clean Middle and Latter part fine breeze and good weather still cruising saw 4 sails so ends
