

Monday
June 24th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 104° 35'

Commenced with brisk trades saw finbacks at 8 P.M. spoke the ship Abigail of New Bedford Capt Clark and visited. Middle part strong winds and pleasant weather. Latter part the same nothing in sight from aloft. Employed variously so ends 6 months out.

Tuesday
June 25th
1833.
Left 5²⁵
Long 104° 43'

Commenced with brisk winds at 8 P.M. saw a carcass at 9 P.M. Double reefed the top sails and in the main. Top Gallant sails, middle part much the same. Latter part strong trades saw nothing.

Wednesday
June 26th
1833.
Left 6⁰⁰
Long 104° 45'

Commenced with brisk wind and squally middle part the same. Latter part strong trades at 6 P.M. saw a barque of our weather bow at 12 saw a ship of our weather beam. All hands variously employed in ship duty so ends their twenty four hours.

Thursday
June 27th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 104° 45'

Commenced with strong winds and squally saw nothing from aloft. Middle part the same. Latter part at 6 A.M. set all sail saw 2 ships so ends.

Friday
June 28th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 104° 01'

Commenced with brisk winds saw nothing from the mast heads at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part at 12 heavy squally called all hands and in 2nd reef of the top sail and in 1st and spanker. Latter part more moderate. Set the top sails and top Gallant sails and jibs and spanker nothing in sight from the mast heads so ends with hard times for whales.

Saturday
June 29th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰

Commenced with brisk winds at 3 P.M. hauled the main royal mast to put the vane up and then sent it up again at 6 P.M. tacked to the N.E. Middle part brisk winds. Latter part the same. All hands variously employed in ship duty saw nothing so ends their twenty four hours.

Sunday
June 30th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 104° 47'

Commenced with brisk wind and pleasant weather at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part fine weather. Latter part at 3 P.M. saw a sail on the opposite tack at 4 P.M. made sail at 5 P.M. saw a ship two points of our bow standing towards us saw she was in pursuit of whale tacked ship and left of for her and run down two hours she had taken a whale alongside but did not speak her.

we called it the Charles and Henry of Nantucket at 10 A.M. luffed by the wind saw nothing more from the mast head so ends.

Monday
July 1st
1833.

Commenced with brisk trades at 6 P.M. shortened sail and tacked to the N.E. Middle part strong trades. Latter part the same saw nothing from aloft at 11 P.M. tacked ship so ends.

Tuesday
July 2nd
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 104° 58'

Commenced with strong wind at 8 P.M. tacked ship and by 12 P.M. at 12 P.M. in 2nd reef of the top sails. Middle part strong trades. Latter part the same at 8 P.M. saw a ship of our lee beam on the opposite tack saw finback nearly at the same time. Variously employed.

Wednesday
July 3rd
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 105° 23'

Commenced with strong trades at 6 P.M. shortened sail and tacked. Middle part strong winds and squally in 2nd reef of the main top sail. Latter part the same saw a finback so ends.

Thursday
July 4th
1833.
Long 106° 33'

Commenced with strong winds and squally saw a ship off our lee beam saw no spouts. Middle part strong winds. Latter part saw 3 ships and saw a finback so ends with moderating breeze and a large swell.

Friday
July 5th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 106° 47'

Commenced with moderating breeze and a heavy swell at 3 P.M. spoke the ship Meager and at 4 P.M. spoke the Abigail and hoisted more moderate set more sail. Middle part brisk trades at 8 P.M. set the flying jib and top Gallant sail the Meager and the Abigail still in sight so ends.

Saturday
July 6th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 106° 34'

Commenced with strong trades by 12 P.M. at 4 P.M. saw spouts of our lee beam kept off for them but did not see any thing more of them luffed by the wind again. Middle part fine weather. Latter part the same at 10 A.M. went down the main top Gallant sail to shorten it saw a finback the reaper in sight so ends. Variously employed on ship duty.

Sunday
July 7th
1833.
Left 4⁰⁰
Long 106° 47'

Commenced with fine weather but no spouts at 2 P.M. spoke and hoisted the Meager. Middle part brisk winds. Latter part the same the reaper still in sight saw a great many finbacks so ends.
