<p>Saturday August 30.1833</p> <p>Sat 2.58 Long 81.00</p>	<p>Commences with thick weather and moderate winds by up SE at 2 PM saw Point St Elena bearing E by S distance 15 miles at 3 PM saw more land abetter of our lie bow at 4 1/2 PM St Elena bore E distance 16 miles at 6 1/2 PM Tacked ship and by up West Middle part brisk winds Latter part at 7 PM Tacked ship and by up SE saw beaches and finbacks</p>	<p>1833 1833 42.35</p>	<p>Commences with brisk winds standing of from the land at 3 PM Tacked again and stood in Cape Blanca of our lie bow at 6 PM Tacked and by up SE by 1/2 mile part the same Latter part moderate winds at 7 AM saw 4 points of our weather bow saw a great many finbacks and humpbacks and some sword fish</p>
<p>Sunday August 4.1833</p> <p>Sat 3.38 Long 80.17</p>	<p>Commences with light winds and hazy weather Middle part at 2 AM saw the land Cape Blanca ahead by up SE by 1/2 stood in within 10 miles of it and tacked and by up NW by 1/2 with the 1/2 Main top sail aback at 5 AM wore round and stood in at 10 AM spoke the Frances of New Bedford Capt. Abby 6 months out with 200 bbls saw another sail of our lie beam at 11 AM wore by again saw a great many finbacks and porpoises so ends</p>	<p>1833 1833 81.20</p>	<p>Commences with brisk winds Tacked ship and by up SE Middle part Tacked ship again Latter part light winds saw a great many Black Fish and humpbacks so ends these 24 hours</p>
<p>Monday August 5.1833</p> <p>Sat 4.00 Long 71.17</p>	<p>Commences with light winds and thick weather saw several finbacks and humpbacks Tacked ship and stood off from the land Middle part Tacked ship and stood in saw a great many spots and Black Fish part of two Boats to off a black fish but did not fasten came on board and took the Boats up so ends</p>	<p>1833 1833 52 71.17</p>	<p>Commences with light winds saw a great many spots but no sperm whales at 4 1/2 PM Tacked ship and by up SE at 1 1/2 PM saw a school of Black Fish part of two Boats and struck one but did not save him the iron came out at 7 PM Tacked again and by up SE Middle part much the same weather Latter part at 8 AM saw a sail of our lie beam standing towards us at 9 AM spoke her it proved to be the Pactoles of Fair Haven Capt. Grenall 8 months out with 30 bbls reported the ontario of Nantucket with 100 bbls 6 months out so ends variously Employed</p>
<p>Tuesday August 6.1833</p>	<p>Commences with light winds by up SE at 3 PM saw the land and stood in until 4 1/2 PM and then stood off again Cape Blanca being about 12 miles from us Middle part much the same</p>	<p>1833</p>	<p>Commences with light winds were round to help Company with the other ship the Capt on board of us at half past 11 PM saw the other ship fire from the stern with colours out at the Middle peak left of and saw spots ahead they proving to be hump backs lifted by the wind Capt. Grenall went on board</p>
