Commenced with light winds by up S.W. by S at 3 P.M.  
P.M. saw Black fish lowered two boats but did  
not fasten at 8 P.M. took in the 4 lying job  
Main and Mizen Top Gallant Sails Miller part  
much the same latter part commenced break  
ing out the Beef pork and flour to cooper saw  
several Finbacks and Black Fish - 50 Ends

August

Commenced with light winds Employed in coop  
ering the meat and flour at 2 P.M. took in  
Ship and by up East at 6 P.M. took in the light  
Sails Miller part light winds latter part the  
same at 8 P.M. set the light sails Employed  
in Coopering our Provisions - 50 Ends

Wednesday  
August  
14<sup>th</sup> 1833

1<sup>st</sup> 30<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with light at 6 P.M. finished Coop  
ering the Provisions and washed off the ice by  
at 6 P.M. took in the light Sails Miller part  
the same weather latter part the same saw a  
number of finbacks and porpoises and some Black  
fish all hands busily employed on ship duty

Thursday  
August  
15<sup>th</sup> 1833

2 Boats  
75 lbs

Commenced with light winds put up the Fore and  
Main Gyal yards at 6 P.M. took in the light  
sails and in job Main sail and spanker and haul  
up the Fore sail and wore ship and by up South  
Miller part wore ship again latter part saw sperm  
Whales at 8 P.M. lowered 3 Boats and took one at 10 A.M.  
took him along side at 50<sup>th</sup> commenced cutting down

Commenced with pleasant weather and light  
winds at 3 P.M. finished cutting in the Boat and  
junk and left the Case alongside at 4 P.M. set the  
watch the bar board watch Employed in getting  
to Boil Miller part the same latter part finished  
Sailing the Case and made sail 50 Ends

Saturday  
August  
17<sup>th</sup> 1833

Commenced with light winds by up S.W. all hands  
Employed in boiling Miller part the same

Saturday  
6<sup>th</sup> 1833

Latter part at 10 A.M. finished boiling and washed  
of the decks saw a number of finbacks 50 Ends

Sunday  
August  
13<sup>th</sup> 1833  
Satt by  
7<sup>th</sup> 13<sup>th</sup>  
Long by  
4<sup>th</sup> 17<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with light winds Employed in Coopering  
the oil at 6 P.M. took in Sail and wore ship  
and by up S.W. Miller part light winds and  
calms at 2 P.M. wore ship at 8 A.M. saw Sugar  
Point bearing East distance 35 miles wore ship and  
headed of again saw nothing more from aloft

Monday  
August  
14<sup>th</sup> 1833

Commenced with light winds steered of S.W. until  
4 P.M. and then hauled on a wind and by up S.W.  
light at 6 P.M. took in Sail Miller part much  
the same tack and ship latter part saw finbacks

August  
15<sup>th</sup> 1833

7<sup>th</sup> 13<sup>th</sup>

4<sup>th</sup> 17<sup>th</sup>

Commenced with brisk winds saw a great many hump  
backs and saw two sails one of our lee bow and one  
of our weather beam a remnant of our  
our lee proved to be a Brig working to the windward  
ward at 3 P.M. saw sperm whales at 4 P.M. lowered  
2 three boats and chased to the windward but  
did not get fast at 6 P.M. spoke the ship of our  
weather beam which proved to be the Maria  
of New Bedford Capt. Hedges 26 months out with  
900 lbs just out from Galis Miller by two under  
short sail latter part at 6 P.M. saw a sperm  
Whale lowered and chased but did not fasten at  
9 A.M. came on board again saw a large num  
ber of Whales ahead and of the lee bow part  
of all Boats struck one slightly but dropped  
from her again at 3 P.M. gave up the chase and  
came on board

Wednesday  
August  
16<sup>th</sup> 1833

Commenced with light winds the Boat of a chase  
ing at 3 P.M. came on board again the Whale  
going to the windward at 3 P.M. saw another  
school of Whales of our lee bow at 6 P.M. took in  
our light sails Miller part brisk winds  
latter part the same at 9 A.M. saw  
land and saw a Brig standing off from the land  
Employed in Coopering the oil to stow down  
saw a number of finbacks 50 Ends
