

Thursday
August
22nd 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 44'
Commenced with strong breeze by East steered
in for Augaga Point at 2 P.M. tacked off and
saw a ship under our lee at 6 P.M. took in the
light sails. Under part much the same weather
Latter part strong wind employed in stowing down
our oil saw some humpbacks and finbacks 50 ends

Friday
August
23rd 1833
Lat 4° 44'
Long 141° 28'
Commenced with strong wind employed in stow-
ing down the oil at 4 P.M. saw the Maria of
New Bedford at 3 P.M. spoke and boarded at 6 P.M.
finished stowing down and cleared up the deck
stowed down 6 bbls and 19 gallons. Under part strong
wind. Latter part the same saw finbacks and
humpbacks black fish and a plenty of birds 50 ends

Saturday
August
24th 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 25'
Commenced with brisk trades headed in for the land
at 4 P.M. saw the Maria and spoke the Maria and
boarded at 10 P.M. tacked off from the land. Under
part much the same weather. Latter part brisk
trades saw a great many whales but no sperm
whale saw a ship so ends these 24 hours

Sunday
August
25th 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 05'
Commenced with brisk trades at 1 P.M. tacked
and stood in towards the land at 4 P.M.
spoke with the Barch of New Bedford Capt.
Coffin 28 months out with 1200 bbls and boarded.
Under part moderate wind. Latter part brisk trades
and thick weather saw the Barch but did not
speak her so ends nothing more in from a light

Monday
August
26th 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 09'
Commenced with brisk trades saw the Maria and
saw a brig at 4 P.M. saw Augaga Point bearing
N distance 8 miles tacked ship and stood off.
Under part fine weather. Latter part much the same
Latter saw a number of finbacks employed in painting the
waist so ends

Tuesday
August
27th 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 05'
Commenced with moderate wind and pleasant weather
saw some humpbacks beaching at 5 P.M. spoke the
Maria and Barch of New Bedford and boarded.
Under part brisk wind. Latter part strong
wind and squally saw no sperm whale

Wednesday
August
28th 1833
Lat 4° 45'
Long 141° 20'
Commenced with strong trade and squally at 5 P.M.
in the reef of the Pop Dais and in the Maria's
Under part much the same. Latter part strong
wind and squally saw nothing from a light 50 ends

Thursday
August
29th 1833
Lat 4° 45'
Long 141° 20'
Commenced with strong wind and squally at 5 P.M.
shortened sail and wore ship and stood off. Under part
much the same. Latter part light wind saw nothing
from a light 50 ends all hands variously employed on ship

Friday
August
30th 1833
Lat 4° 45'
Long 141° 10'
Commenced with light wind at 4 P.M. kept off from
from the wind and at 6 P.M. saw 3 ships a head at 6 P.M.
spoke the Barch in company with the Golconda and
Maria boarded the Barch. Under part much the same
Latter part light wind at 4 P.M. saw a dead humpback
saw several ships and made the land at 4 P.M. P. Hyge

Saturday
August
31st 1833
Lat 4° 45'
Long 141° 02'
Commenced with light wind saw a number of finbacks
at 6 P.M. shortened sail standing off from the land
Under part light wind. Latter part the same
saw humpbacks and finbacks and saw one ship

Sunday
September
1st 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 11'
Commenced with brisk trades at 3 P.M. spoke the
Luminary of Warren Capt. Gardner 5 months out with
15 bbls of oil went on board and spent the evening
at 9 P.M. came on board and single reefed the
Pop Dais. Under part strong wind. Latter part
more moderate out reefs and set the light sail
saw a great many finbacks and humpbacks passed
the Luminary but did not speak so ends

Monday
September
2nd 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 42'
Commenced with moderate wind and pleasant
weather headed in towards the land at 6 P.M.
shortened sail. Under part much the same
Latter part made sail saw several ships
so ends nothing more in sight

Tuesday
September
3rd 1833
Lat 4° 46'
Long 141° 20'
Commenced with moderate wind saw several
ships at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Under part much
the same. Latter part light wind saw Point
Augaga at 11 A.M. kept off for Paytes so ends
no whale in sight from the Mast head
