

56 Sunday October 27th 1833	Commenced with high winds at 1 P.M. lost sight of the Rambler on opposite tack at 6 P.M. wore ship and shortened sail. Middle part the same. Latter strong breezes saw nothing from aught so end.	Monday November 3rd 1833	Commenced with high wind saw nothing from the Mast heads at 1 P.M. saw the Land at 4 P.M. took in sail and stood off at 6 P.M. took in sail. Middle part the same. Latter part moderate. Steered off N. by N. in company with the Rambler saw no spots so end.
Tuesday October 28th 1833	Commenced with strong wind at 1 P.M. saw the Rambler and spoke the Cape of New Bedford Capt. Smith 13 months out with 400 bbls at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part much the same weather. Latter part high wind made sail saw the Cape on the opposite tack saw nothing from aught so end with cloudy weather.	Tuesday November 4th 1833	Commenced with moderate wind steering of before the wind at 3 P.M. spoke and boarded the Rambler at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part the same. Latter part saw 2 ships saw no spots so end.
Wednesday October 29th 1833	Commenced with high wind saw the Land at 1 P.M. at 1 P.M. saw sperm whales lowered and took one at 6 P.M. took him alongside and by him. Middle part moderate weather. Latter part the same at 8 P.M. commenced cutting at 4 P.M. finished and made sail. Camp began boiling saw nothing so end.	Wednesday November 5th 1833	Commenced with moderate wind at 1 P.M. spoke the Perseverance and boarded in company with the Rambler and Mount Vernon at 4 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part the same. Latter high wind saw two ships but no whales so end.
Thursday October 30th 1833	Commenced with high wind. Employed in boiling at 1 P.M. saw two ships to windward one of them steering of with steering sails out the other on a wind at 4 P.M. finished boiling took in the jib and spanker. Middle part the same. Latter part high wind saw a ship to windward on the off shore took saw no whales so end.	Thursday November 6th 1833	Commenced with high winds steering of S. by E at 1 P.M. spoke the Mount Vernon Capt. Coffin 14 months with 500 bbls saw a carcass. Saw the Rambler to windward at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part the same. Latter part moderate saw no spots the ship sight.
Friday October 31st 1833	Commenced with high wind at 2 P.M. saw the Land at 1 P.M. wore ship and shortened sail. Middle and latter part moderate saw nothing.	Friday November 7th 1833	Commenced with light winds steering of East at 3 P.M. spoke the Perseverance of London Capt. Mail 20 months out with 1300 bbls at 6 P.M. shortened sail made the Land at 8 P.M. at 9 P.M. took in of Middle part fine weather. Latter part the same saw no whales saw four ships and made the Land so end.
Saturday November 1st 1833	Commenced with high winds and pleasant weather saw a ship to the windward at 6 P.M. shortened sail. Middle part moderate. Latter part at 6 A.M. made more sail and wore ship and stood off from the Land at 8 A.M. saw the Rambler at 9 A.M. spoke and boarded saw nothing.	Saturday November 8th 1833	Commenced with moderate winds at 3 P.M. spoke the Perseverance and boarded at 6 P.M. took in sail. Middle part fine weather. Latter part squally attended with heavy showers of rain saw nothing but porpoises so end.
Sunday November 2nd 1833	Commenced with high wind in company with the Rambler at 6 P.M. took in sail saw a ship to windward. Middle part high wind. Latter part the same. Made sail still in company with the Rambler saw nothing from aught so end. Thus twenty four hours.	Sunday November 9th 1833	Commenced with squally rainy weather wore ship at 2 P.M. at 6 P.M. took in sail and wore ship again. Middle part high wind and squally. Latter part the same saw a ship to the windward and saw Black fish and Porpoises so end with constant rain.
