January
23rd 1834
Lat 40° 17' N
Long 108° 40' W
Commenced with moderate wind and pleasant weather saw nothing at 8 P.M. shortened sail Middle part the same latter part at 4 A.M. saw sperm whales lowered 3 boats and killed one and took him alongside at 3 P.M. so ended Company with the Mount Vernon



Thursday
January
23rd 1834
Lat 40° 10' N
Long 108° 59' W
Commenced with light wind Employed in cutting at 6 P.M. finished cutting and filled away and run down and spoke the Mount Vernon Middle part the watches employed in getting the works ready for boiling latter part employed in boiling saw nothing from aloft

Friday
January
24th 1834
Lat 40° 03' N
Long 109° 27' W
Commenced with moderate wind and pleasant weather at 8 P.M. finished boiling and by 11 A.M. and latter part fine weather saw nothing in Company with the Mount Vernon

Saturday
January
25th 1834
Lat 40° 11' 2" N
Long 111° 11' W
Commenced with brisk wind saw nothing at 6 P.M. spoke the Mount Vernon Middle part by 11 with the main yard aback latter part beaved forward and steered of free from the wind saw finbacks so ended

Sunday
January
26th 1834
Lat 40° 31' N
Long 112° 16' W
Commenced with brisk wind saw nothing at 6 P.M. spoke the Mount Vernon Middle part Moderate under short sail latter part made sail at 9 A.M. the Mount Vernon set her coulers for whales at 10 A.M. saw three and lowered 3 boats and chased to windward whale going quick did not come up with them at 11 P.M. came on board so ended

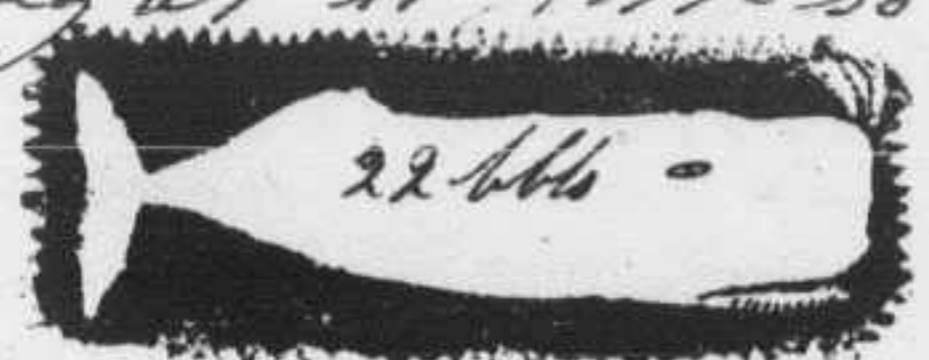
Monday
January
27th 1834
Lat 40° 35' N
Long 113° 4' W
Commenced with Brisk wind at 6 P.M. shortened sail and spoke the Mount Vernon Middle part backed ship at 4 P.M. latter part backed back again and by 11 P.M. saw sperm whales saw a finback and porpoises so ended pleasant weather

Tuesday
January
28th 1834
Lat 41° 24' N
Long 114° 12' W
Commenced with moderate wind and pleasant weather saw nothing at 8 P.M. shortened sail and spoke the Mount Vernon Middle part light wind latter part the same at 4 P.M. parted Company with the Mount Vernon on at 4 P.M. saw two ships of our sea how which proved to be the Laker of New York and the George Washington of Warham

Wednesday
January
29th 1834
Lat 41° 18' N
Long 114° 12' W
Commenced with light wind spoke the George Washington 15 months out with 600 blks and the Laker of New York 14 months out with 400 blks and boarded at 4 P.M. shortened sail and steered of N.W. Middle part by 11 with the main yard aback latter part steered of N.W. saw Porpoises and caught one so ended

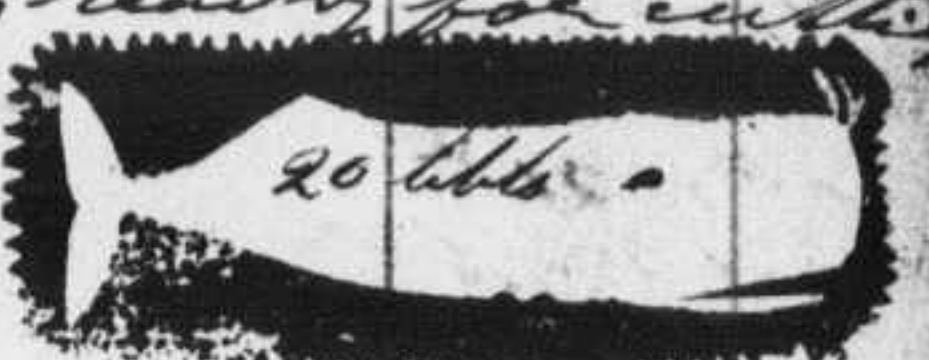
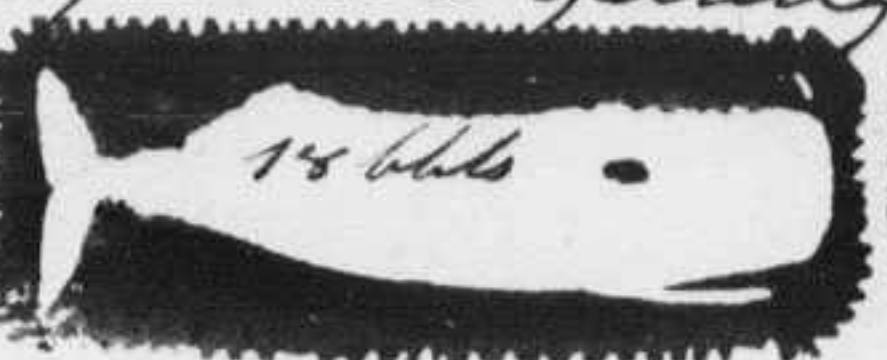
Thursday
January
30th 1834
Lat 41° 18' N
Long 114° 12' W
Commenced with light winds from the S.E. steered to the N.W. saw a number of Porpoises at 4 P.M. shortened sail and hove too and by 11 P.M. Middle part the same latter part steered S.W. saw Grampuses and porpoises

Friday
January
31st 1834
Lat 41° 18' N
Long 114° 12' W
Commenced with light winds saw nothing from the West heads at 6 P.M. shortened sail and by 11 P.M. Middle part the same latter part at 6 A.M. saw sperm whales lowered 3 boats and killed one took him alongside at 9 A.M. and commenced cutting at 9 A.M. finished and commenced boiling at 4 P.M. so ended with pleasant weather



Saturday
February
1st 1835
Lat 41° 18' N
Long 116° 16' W
Commenced with light wind Employed in boiling saw nothing at 6 P.M. made ship and by 11 P.M. Middle part the same latter part at 6 A.M. finished boiling so ended

Sunday
February
2nd 1835
Lat 41° 18' N
Long 117° 12' W
Commenced with light wind steered N.W. saw finbacks at 5 P.M. saw beached head 5 miles distant called them sperm whales did not come up with them Middle part by 11 latter part filled away at 9 A.M. saw sperm whales lowered and took 3 took them alongside at 11 A.M. Employed in getting ready for cutting



Monday
February
3rd 1835
Lat 41° 03' N
Long 117° 12' W
Commenced with light wind Employed in cutting at 5 P.M. finished and commenced boiling Middle part the same with light squall of rain latter part fine weather so ended
