

Thursday May 4 th 1834 Lat 30° 12'	Commenced with Calms Employed in Coopers oil While part the same latter part saw finbacks so ends lying by under close reef. Main Top Sail and Fore Sail
Friday May 5 th 1834 Lat 30° 23'	Commenced with Calms Employed in Coop ering oil While and latter part the same saw Blackfish and some small fish so ends with pleasant weather
Saturday May 6 th 1834 Lat 30° 17'	Commenced with Calm weather Employed in Coopers oil Latter part saw two ships at 4 PM finished the towing down 500 lbs of oil so ends with light air
Sunday May 7 th 1834 Lat 30° 26'	Commenced with light wind from the South and West by up on our larboard tack set all sail at 4 PM shortened sails to single reef. Top Sail latter part saw the Vigmarc but did not speak her side
Monday May 8 th 1834 Lat 30° 26'	Commenced with thick foggy weather at 1 PM spoke the Vineyard of 300 tons 20 months out with 14 lbs of oil at 4 PM shortened sail and by 6 PM part the same latter part made sail and steered N 3/4 W saw a finback so ends
Tuesday May 9 th 1834	Commenced with high wind and pleasant saw nothing from aloft While part shortened sails and by latter part made sail and steered N 3/4 W so ends
Wednesday May 10 th 1834 Lat 29° 30'	Commenced with brisk wind from the SE Steered N 3/4 W at 4 PM spoke the yard and exchanged some bread for meat at 4 PM shortened sail and by 6 PM part the same latter part made sail saw two ships so ends employed in repairing sails
Thursday May 11 th 1834 Lat 29° 26'	Commenced with moderate winds and pleasant weather Employed in repairing sail at 4 PM shortened sail and by latter part made sail saw one ship so ends with light air and Calms

Friday May 12 th 1834 Lat 29° 21'	Commenced with light air and thick weather saw nothing from aloft at 4 PM shortened sail and by 6 PM headed to the Southward and latter part the same latter part made sail saw finbacks and Porpoises all hands variously employed on board so ends with fine weather
Saturday May 13 th 1834 Lat 29° 20'	Commenced with fine breeze and pleasant saw porpoises at sunset shortened sail and by latter part made sail saw nothing so ends
Sunday May 14 th 1834 Lat 29° 50'	Commenced with fine pleasant weather saw a great number of finbacks and birds at sun set shortened sail latter part saw porpoises so ends headed to West with all sail set
Monday May 15 th 1834 Lat 29° 31'	Commenced with light wind saw a finback at 4 PM shortened sail and by latter part made sail saw nothing all hands variously employed on ship duty so ends then 21 hours
Tuesday May 16 th 1834	Commenced with light breeze saw nothing but porpoises and birds at 4 PM wore ship and double reefed the Top Sail and steered N 3/4 W While part the same latter part made all sail and luffed by the wind saw nothing from aloft Employed in fitting the Spirit Sack yard so ends with light breezes and pleasant
Wednesday May 17 th 1834	Commenced with light wind and pleasant weather at 4 PM shortened sail and steered N 3/4 W While part the same latter part made sail saw a ship to windward all hands variously employed on board so ends
Thursday May 18 th 1834 Lat 28° 09'	Commenced with light wind saw two ships one to windward and one to leeward at 4 PM shortened sail headed to the Southward and eastward While part strong wind and squally attended with rain latter part strong wind saw the three Brothers to windward at 10 AM spoke the Voleto of New London Capt. Brewster 2000 tons out with 1100 lbs of oil all variously employed in ship duty
