

Friday
May 23rd
1834
Lat 24° 15'
Long 165° 12'

Commenced with light breezes in company with the *Hector* at 7 PM shortened sail by taking in the top Gallant Sails and 2nd reef of the top Sails. Middle part some rain. Latter part thick foggy weather nothing in sight & end.

Saturday
May 24th
1834
Lat 25° 42'
Long 165° 05'

Commenced with strong breezes at 5 PM saw sperm whales after death how going quick to the Southward and Westward lowered but did not faster came on board and took up the boats and shortened sail. Middle part much latter part some squalls of rain at 10 AM saw sperm whales going quick to the SW lowered boats but did not faster came on board and took up the

Sunday
May 25th
1834
Lat 25° 34'
Long 164° 11'

Commenced with moderate wind at 12 PM saw sperm whales lowered and killed one at 4 PM took her along side and and shortened sail employed in getting ready to cut in. Middle part Moderate latter part the same at 5 AM commenced cutting at 11 finished and began to sail so end nothing in sight.



Monday
May 26th
1834
Lat 25° 42'
Long 165° 08'

Commenced with Moderate wind and pleasant employed in boiling at 1 PM saw finbacks at 4 PM took in sail and set the Dutch. Latter part saw nothing from aloft employed in boiling so end.

Tuesday
May 27th
1834

Commenced with light breezes and pleasant weather at 4 PM finished boiling and set the quarter watches. Latter part saw finbacks all hands variously employed on board so end.

Wednesday
May 28th
1834
Lat 24° 14'

Commenced with light winds saw finbacks. Middle part by by under short sail. Latter part made sail at 8 PM saw a ship set our sign but she did not answer it at 9 1/2 AM saw another ship and spoke her which proved to be the *Columbus* of New Bedford Capt. Osborn 21 months out with 2200 bbls of oil all hands variously employed on board so end.

Thursday
May 29th
1834

Commenced with brisk wind at 5 PM squally attended with rain in fore and main top sail and 3rd reef of the main top sail and in fore sail and by in company with the *Columbus* of New Bedford at Day light made sail and steered SE so end with strong wind.

Friday
May 30th
1834
Lat 27° 05' N
Long 165° 56' E

Commenced with brisk wind steered SE in company with the *Columbus* at 7 PM shortened sail huffed by the wind. Middle part the same. Latter part employed in stowing down oil at 10 AM finished and washed off the decks so end with pleasant weather.

Saturday
May 31st
1834
Lat 28° 04' N
Long 165° 40' E

Commenced with light winds at 8 PM spoke the *Redman* of New Bedford Capt. Lewis 11 months out with 2500 bbls of oil at 10 PM steered NW. Latter part the same saw nothing from aloft employed in repairing the job so end with light wind and pleasant.

Sunday
June 1st
1834

Commenced with light winds and pleasant weather nothing in sight steering NW by N at 4 PM took in the main top Gallant sail and 2nd reef of the top Sails steering the same course. Middle part the same. Latter part strong wind at 8 AM saw sperm whales lowered but did not get any at 9 1/2 came on board the weather being quite bad attended with heavy squalls of wind and rain in fore and main and 3rd reef of the main top Sails so end.

Monday
June 2nd
1834

Commenced with strong wind and squally at 12 PM were set the double reef top Sails fore and main sail saw nothing from aloft. Middle and latter part much the same employed in mending sail so end with rugged weather.

Tuesday
June 3rd
1834

Commenced with strong wind headed to the N and West under double reef top Sails at sunset took in sail. Fore and main ship by up East. Latter part set the double reef top Sails and fore sail and were ship saw no sport from aloft so end with strong wind from the NE and a heavy sea.
