

Wednesday  
June 4<sup>th</sup> 1834

Commenced with strong wind from the East and East by on our starboard tack under double reefed Top Sails at 4 P.M. bent the Fore Top Sail which we had been repairing at sunset took in all but the close reefed Main Top Sail and staysails Middle part the same latter part set the double reefed top sails and jib and tacked ship at 5 P.M. tacked the ship and found oil to come to the pumps searched for the leak but did not find any so ended

Thursday  
June 5<sup>th</sup> 1834

Commenced with strong wind from the East saw nothing from aloft at 4 P.M. shortened sail latter part wind and weather the same at 8 A.M. saw a break left of for it one hour but did not see it again at 10 A.M. saw a ship which proved to be the Pacific of New Bedford so ends

Friday  
June 6<sup>th</sup> 1834

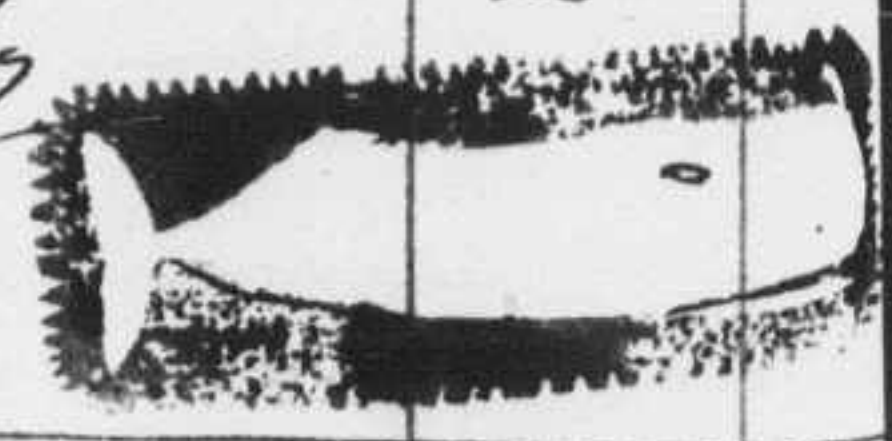
Commenced with strong wind at 4 P.M. spoke the Pacific of New Bedford and boarded at 7 P.M. shortened sail heading to the Southward latter part steered of N and E saw nothing so ends with light wind and pleasant

Saturday  
June 7<sup>th</sup> 1834  
Lat 29.55

Commenced with light wind and pleasant saw finbacks at 4 P.M. shortened sail and heeled by the wind to the Eastward latter part light air and calm saw squid so ends

Sunday  
June 8<sup>th</sup> 1834

Commenced with light air at 4 P.M. saw sperm whales at 5 P.M. lowered all boats and chased to sunset and then came on board at 8 P.M. took up the boats and shortened sail whales going quick to the South and West latter part at day light made sail light wind but thick rainy weather at 9 A.M. saw sperm whales lowered all boats killed one and took him alongside at 12 P.M. employed getting ready for cutting



Monday  
June 1<sup>st</sup> 1834

Commenced with light wind and pleasant weather at 11 P.M. lowered for whales but got none at 3 P.M. came on board and commenced cutting finished at sunset Middle and latter part employed in boiling saw nothing from aloft so ends

Tuesday  
June 2<sup>nd</sup> 1834  
Lat 30-34

Commenced with light wind and pleasant saw killers at 6 P.M. finished boiling at 7 P.M. took in sail latter part set all sail saw finbacks so ends with light air

Wednesday  
June 3<sup>rd</sup> 1834

Commenced with light wind headed to the Eastward with all sail set saw finbacks at 1 P.M. saw two ships to the windward at 4 P.M. shortened sail latter part thick wind and thick weather saw a ship to windward so ends saw some squid and birds

Thursday  
June 4<sup>th</sup> 1834

Commenced with brisk wind and thick weather at 5 P.M. spoke the Corinthian of Bristol Capt. Greenall in company with the Enterprise of Nantucket at sunset took in sail headed to the N by S Middle part the same latter part wore ship to up East saw nothing from aloft so ends with thick weather

Friday  
June 5<sup>th</sup> 1834  
Lat 30-37

Commenced with light wind and thick weather at 6 P.M. boarded the Enterprise saw the Corinthian to windward at 7 P.M. took in sail at 8 P.M. squally attended with rain Middle part the same latter part tacked ship saw the Enterprise on the opposite tack saw two more ships to windward so ends with some squall of rain

Saturday  
June 6<sup>th</sup> 1834

Commenced with moderate wind saw a ship from aloft at 11 P.M. tacked ship at 7 P.M. shortened sail saw two ships ahead Middle part the same wind and weather latter part made sail saw the Enterprise and Columbus at 4 P.M. the Enterprise tacked in company with us so ends saw nothing from aloft
