

Remarks of a Whaling voyage on board

Sunday Oct 30th

Strong breeze from the south
 Ring leaking badly So ends this day
 Lat 32° 43' N
 Long 70° 23' W

Oct 31st

At 8 o'clock A.M. the wind began
 to blow hard from the E.S.E. At
 11 o'clock A.M. rolled the waist-
 boat up on her side. And took
 the craft all out of the Larboard
 and Starboard boats. At one
 o'clock P.M. the weather most
 erected a little. The wind veered
 gradually to the W.N.W. and
 blew stronger. Pumped every
 watch, over two hundred strokes
 an hour. So ends this day

Lat 32° 45' N
 Long 71° 13' W

Nov 1st

Begins with a heavy gale from
 the W.N.W. with frequent squalls
 with rain. and hauled gradually
 to the N.N.W. Leaking over
 two hundred strokes an hour
 So ends this day

Lat 32° 36' N
 Long 70° 39' W

Wednesday Nov 2nd

Strong breeze from the W.N.W. with
 frequent squalls with rain. At
 1 o'clock A.M. made sail and
 steered S.E.W. Watch employed
 doing ships duty. So ends this day
 Lat 31° 23' N
 Long 71° 21' W

Nov 3rd

Light variable winds. Steering W. by S.
 Watch employed doing ships duty.
 Three sails in sight.
 So ends this day.

Lat 30° 22' N
 Long 72° 45' W

Nov 4th

Light air from the N.W. Brig
 Steering N. Watch employed at
 breaking out the fore and main
 hold. At 6 P.M. took in sail
 and lay to with topsail aback
 on the Port tack So ends this day

Lat 30° 16' N
 Long 73° 36' W

Nov 5th

Light variable winds. Saw a large
 steamer steering N. watch employed
 at breaking out the after hold and
 doing other jobs. At 5:30 P.M. took in
 sail. So ends this day
 Lat 30° 05' N
 Long 74° 43' W
