Remarks of a whaling voyage on board.

Monday Jan 23rd

Light westerly winds with frequent squalls of wind and rain. Watch employed doing ship's duty. Saw one finback. Pumps carefully attended to. So ends this day
 Lat 29 24 N
 Long 51 50 W

Tuesday Jan 24th

Begins with strong breeze from N.E. Heaving to S.E. During the day the wind hauled to the Eastward at 6 P.M. Heaving by the wind S.E. Pumps carefully attended to. So ends this day Lat 28 50
 Long 50 18

Wednesday Jan 25th

Begins with a calm at 9 a.m. the light breeze from the Northward. Steering East. Watch employed doing ship's duty. So ends this day Lat 28 53 N
 Long 50 00 W

Thursday Jan 26th

Very light variable winds mostly from the eastward. Brig making very little headway. Pumps attended to. Leaks very little in calm weather. So ends this day
 Lat 28 48. Long 48 59

Friday Jan 27th

Light wind from the N.E. Steering by the wind East. Lowered the Larboard boat to pick up a few pieces of yellow pine plank. Pumps carefully attended to. So ends this day Lat 29 00 N
 Long 47 00 W

Sat Jan 28th

Light wind from the S.E. Steering by the wind on the Starboard tack. Broke out water, bread, flour, oil. Pumps attended to. So ends this day
 Lat 30 00
 Long 46 27

Sunday Jan 29th

Light wind from South East. On the Starboard tack steering by the wind Two sails in sight. So ends this day Lat 30 54
 Long 44 47

Monday Jan 30th

Begins with squally weather wind to the Southward and eastward, wore ship at 1 P.M. on the fore tack the rest of the day. One sail in sight. Brig leaks two hundred strokes on the port tack Lat 48 28 N
 So ends this day Long 31 10 W
