Tuesday April 3rd

Begin with very strong N.E.
 Trades and make the same
 Nothing in sight Lat $14^{\circ} 58' N$
 Long $36^{\circ} 41' W$

Wed April 4th

Very strong N.E. trade wind.
 Pumps carefully attended to. Leaking
 about the same as usual Nothing in
 sight. Ends this day Lat $15^{\circ} 53' N$
 Long $37^{\circ} 27' W$

Thursday April 5th

Very strong N.E. trade wind.
 Two merchant vessels in sight.
 Ends this day Lat $16^{\circ} 58' N$
 Long $37^{\circ} 47' W$

Friday April 6th

Very strong N.E. trade wind.
 Several sails in sight pumps
 carefully attended to ends this day
 Lat $17^{\circ} 52' N$
 Long $38^{\circ} 19' W$

Sat April 7th

Begin with strong trade wind
 and increase during the day
 Nothing in sight Lat $19^{\circ} 01' N$
 Long $38^{\circ} 38' W$

Sunday April 8th

Strong N.E. trade wind.
 Watch employed breaking
 out the main hold. Broke out -
 Bread. Water. Beef. Pork.
 And poor Flour. Lat $18^{\circ} 30' N$
 Long $37^{\circ} 53' W$

Monday April 9th

Strong N.E. trade wind.
 Nothing in sight. Watch employed
 doing ship's duty. Ends this day
 Lat $16^{\circ} 58' N$
 Long $38^{\circ} 41' W$

Tuesday April 10th

Moderate N.E. trades. Squally
 with rain. Nothing in sight.
 Ends this day Lat $17^{\circ} 57' N$
 Long $40^{\circ} 23' W$

Wed April 11th

Strong N.E. trade wind. Nothing
 in sight. Ends this day
 Lat $18^{\circ} 04' N$
 Long $41^{\circ} 39' W$

Thursday April 12th

Very strong N.E. trade wind.
 Squally with considerable wind.
 Saw some kind of a whale skull once.
 Ends this day Lat $16^{\circ} 57' N$ Long $41^{\circ} 21' W$
