Friday May 4th

Moderate N.E. trade wind
 Broke out Molasses. Sugar. Flour.
 Beans. Rice. and Hard Bread.
 Nothing in sight. So ends this day
 Lat $18^{\circ} 23'$ N
 Long $42^{\circ} 16'$ W

Sat May 5th

Moderate N.E. trade wind.
 Nothing in sight. Leaking a usual
 So ends this day Lat $15^{\circ} 48'$ N
 Long $42^{\circ} 38'$ W

Sunday May 6th

Light N.E. trade wind.
 Nothing in sight So ends this day
 Lat $16^{\circ} 50'$ N
 Long $42^{\circ} 49'$ W

Monday May 7th

Light N.E. trade wind Nothing
 in sight So ends this day
 Lat $17^{\circ} 55'$ N
 Long $43^{\circ} 20'$ W

Tuesday May 8th

Light N.E. trade wind
 Broke out water. Nothing in
 sight So ends this day Lat $18^{\circ} 51'$ N
 Long $43^{\circ} 24'$ W

Wednesday May 9th

Very light trade winds. Nothing in
 sight. But one Grampus.
 So ends this day. Lat $19^{\circ} 20'$ N.
 Long $44^{\circ} 02'$ W.

Thursday May 10th

Light trade winds with frequent
 squalls. Nothing in sight but one
 sail. Leaking same as usual
 So ends this day. Lat $18^{\circ} 48'$ N.
 Long $43^{\circ} 34'$ W.

Friday May 11th

Light N.E. trade winds.
 Struck a small fin back calf.
 And took it on board. One Sperchate
 vessel in sight steering to the
 Southward. So ends this day. Lat $18^{\circ} 26'$
 Long $42^{\circ} 51'$

Sat May 12th

Very light N.E. trade wind. One
 sail in sight. Broke out Pork.
 So ends this day Lat $18^{\circ} 20'$ N
 Long $42^{\circ} 40'$ W

Sunday May 13th

Moderate trade wind. Nothing
 in sight so ends this day
 Lat $19^{\circ} 27'$ N.
 Long $42^{\circ} 16'$ W.
