Remarks of a whaling voyage on board.

Monday May 28th

Moderate N.E. trade wind. Broke out water Beef Biscuit and Molasses. At five thirty 5:30 P.M. Sperm whales were raised by Manuel. De Bourga. on the lee quarter. Could not tell which way they were going. They were to far off And dark came to quick. So ends this day Lat $16^{\circ}32' N$ Long $78^{\circ}44' W$

Tuesday May 29th

Light N.E. Trade wind. Clear pleasant weather. Nothing in sight. Repaired the top sail. Sick men much better. So ends this day Lat $16^{\circ}55' N$ Long $74^{\circ}09' W$

Wednesday May 30th

Very light N.E. Trade wind. Clear pleasant weather. Nothing in sight. So ends this day Lat $16^{\circ}59' N$ Long $77^{\circ}10' W$

Thursday May 31st

Very light air from the eastward. Watch employed at setting up the head stows. Nothing in sight. So ends this day Lat $17^{\circ}02' N$ Long $77^{\circ}15' W$

Friday June 1st

Very Light trade wind. Took down the Main top mast stay. And put another in its place. Put new straps on the cutting guy blocks. Nothing in sight. So ends this day Lat $16^{\circ}25' N$ Long $74^{\circ}09' W$

Sat June 2nd

Very light N.E. Trade wind. Broke out water. Nothing in sight. Leaking same as usual. So ends this day Lat $15^{\circ}59' N$ Long $15^{\circ}38' W$

Sunday 3rd

Begins with strong N.E. trade wind. with frequent squalls. Latter part more moderate. Saw white water. So ends this day Lat $17^{\circ}43' N$ Long $74^{\circ}01' W$

Monday 4th

Strong N.E. Trade wind. Saw Gram. and clear pleasant weather. Leaking same as usual. Leggo Jarvis returned on duty. So ends this day Lat $16^{\circ}01' N$ Long $74^{\circ}01' W$
