Remarks of a whaling voyage on board

Thursday Aug 16th

Began with a calm many porpoises
and grampuses in sight.
Light breeze sprung up about
9 A.M. and lasted till dark
Another man sick with the mumps
So ends this day Lat $36^{\circ}30' N$
Long $36^{\circ}20' W$

Friday Aug 17th

Moderate wind from the S.W.
Saw grampus, Porpoise, and squid.
Saw a large ship steering to the
westward, pump & carefully
attended to. Does not leak so
much in good weather. So ends this
day. Lat $36^{\circ}12' N$
Long $35^{\circ}15' W$

Sat Aug 18th

Strong S.W. wind. Many porpoise
in sight. Sick men a little
better So ends this day
Lat $37^{\circ}01' N$
Long $35^{\circ}57' W$

Sunday Aug 19th

Strong Westerly wind. Nothing
in sight So ends this day
Lat $37^{\circ}25' N$
Long $35^{\circ}49' W$

Monday Aug 20th

Moderate Westerly wind. Saw two
vessels one of which looked like
a whaler. Broke out water
So ends this day Lat $36^{\circ}08' N$
Long $36^{\circ}38' W$

Tuesday Aug 21st

Light variable wind. Many Porpoises
in sight. Saw "Whitewater" Leaking
same as usual So ends this day
Lat $35^{\circ}13' N$
Long $35^{\circ}22' W$

Wednesday Aug 22nd

Light - westerly wind. Saw a small
school of Blackfish. Saw four
merchant vessels going to the East-
ward. Many Porpoises in sight.
So ends this day. Lat $34^{\circ}56' N$
Long $35^{\circ}26' W$

Thursday Aug 23rd

Light westerly wind. Saw three
large rightwaters. So ends this day
Lat $32^{\circ}48' N$
Long $35^{\circ}30' W$
