

Remarks of a whaling Voyage on board

Jan 1st (Lat 19° 40' N)
Begins with very strong Long 19° 22' W
trade winds. Pumped ship every two hours.
Discovered a new leak in the bow above
water. Leaking now over 250 strokes an
hour. Later part a little more moderate.
Broke out water Beans and flour and
Pork. There is now on board 2 bbls of Pork
13 bbls of Beef and 19 bbls of flour.
So ends this day.

Jan 2nd (Lat 18° 50' N)
Begins with very strong Long 19° 10' W
trade wind. Later part the same.
So ends this day.

Jan 3rd
Begins with strong trade (Lat 19° 00' N)
winds. Sperm whales Long 20° 21' W
were raised at 12 M By Antoine
Joseph going quick to the westward.
Lost sight of them untill 4.30 P.M.
When they were again raised by the
same man. Lowered two boats at 6.30
P.M. John Alvis is the L.B. Boat steerer
And Abram Foab the W.B. Boat steerer.
The whalers were going so quick that
there was no chance to strike. Came
on board at dark.
Later part wind about the same. Saw
two Sulphur Bottoms. Saw several
white waters. So ends this day.

Jan 4th
Begins with strong trade (Lat 18° 49' N)
wind Nothing in sight (Long 21° 07' W)
Ends the same.

Jan 5th
Moderate trader Broke out (Lat 19° 44' N)
Beef and water So ends (Long 22° 50' W)
this day.

Jan. Jan 6th
Moderate trade wind (Lat 19° 51' N)
Pumps attended to as (Long 22° 29' W)
usual. Later part the same So ends
this day.

Mon Jan 7th
Moderate trade winds (Lat 19° 20' N)
Saw pumps. So ends this (Long 22° 00' W)

Tuesday Jan 8th
Strong trade winds (Lat 20° 03' N)
Many Porpoise in sight Long 23° 34' W
Pumps carefully attended to as usual.
Broke out water. So ends this day.

Wed. Jan 9th
Very strong trade wind (Lat 18° 19' N).
Watch employed as usual Long 23° 44' W.
doing Ship's duty So ends this day.

Thursday Jan 10th
Very strong trade wind (Lat 27° 32' N)
Broke out Molasses. (Long 24° 28' W)
Flour & Sugar. Later part wind
blowing a gale. St Antoine was seen
at 10 O'clock Am. Many Albacore
in sight So ends this day.

Friday Jan 11th
Begins with a Gale from the N.E.
At 5.30 P.M. run under the lee of
St Antoine. Later part calm.
St Antoine about four miles off.

Sat Jan 12th
Laying under the lee of St Antoine.
Watch employed mending the fore-
sail Clear pleasant weather.
Many Porpoise in sight.
Later part the same So ends
this day.
