Tuesday June 20th 1893

Lat

39° 30'

Long

67° 29'

The gale continued all this day with a few light squalls of rain. Side light and lookout attended to. Wind southwest.

Wednesday 21th

Lat

39° 35'

Long

49° 41'

The gale continued up to 12 P.M. Then it commenced to moderate a little. Set the fore and aft at 11 P.M. and steered south until 7 P.M. then took it in and hove too. Wind west sky cloudy. Saw a vessel light but could not make her out.

Thursday 22nd

Lat

29° 55'

Long

67° 44'

The gale moderated down to a hole sail breeze and continued so the balance of the day. Wind west north west until 10 P.M. then shifted to west and remain unchanged the rest of the day. By observation suppose the chronometer to have taken a jump.

Friday 23th

Wind west with rain and squally weather until 10 P.M. then it cleared off leaving it smoky and a heavy swell from the northward. Whore ship at 5 P.M. standing to the north north west.

Saturday 24th

49° 05'

Weather cloudy with a thick mist all this day. Wind west. At 8 P.M. raised a school of whales from the deck. also saw Sch. E. M. Morse. we both lowered our boats and the Sch. took three and we got one. The three were small ones.

Sunday 25th

48° 20'

Weather thick and cloudy all the day with a strong breeze from the southwest.

Monday June 26th 1893

All hands to work breaking out in the hole for water. The weather still foggy with the wind from the southwest. stood to the northward all this day under short sail.

Tuesday 27th

Lat

30° 57'

Long

49° 01'

The weather not so foggy as yesterday and a little less wind shifting from the southwest to south. stood to the northward and westward all the day.

Wednesday 28th

Lat

30° 55'

Long

49° 10'

Fine weather all this day with a light southerly wind. At 6 P.M. the English steamer Governor of Liverpool passed close to us steering in to the north west. At 8 P.M. where ship heading to the southward eastward.

Thursday 29th

Lat

30° 24'

48° 57'

This day very light wind from the southwest with fine weather and a clear sky. stood to the southeast all this day.

Friday 30th

Lat

30° 10'

Long

48° 39'

Very light wind from the westward all these twenty four hours. At 9 P.M. saw a whaling Sch. to the windward. At 5 P.M. saw a school of large whales going to the westward quick. lowered the boats but did not get near to them. took up the boats at 7 P.M.

Saturday July 1st 1893

Wind west and very light. At 8 P.M. saw a school of whales going to the westward lowered and struck the starboard ^{boat} struck one but stove the
