

Thursday, June 19. 1851.

These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the West. Ship under whole top sail. Close in with the land. Bored for no purpose. at 8 P.M. Steered by the wind to the N.E. saw plenty of loose ice, the middle part more moderate. The latter part calm and very pleasant. Saw 2 ship boiling and a dozen doing nothing. So ends
Lat. 63° 46' N. Long. 179° 36' W.

Friday, June 20.

These 24 hours begins with fine pleasant weather with light winds from the S.E. Ship under all sail steering by the wind to the S.W. saw nothing at 10 P.M. Tacked ship off shore. The middle part light airs the latter part continues much the same. The starboard boat for Whales, at 4 a.m. came on board at 8 a.m. squared the yards steered N.E. So ends
Lat. 63° 15' N. at noon.

Saturday, June 21.

These 24 hours commences with changing weather winds from S.W. to N.E. Ship under all sail steering N by E. at 10 P.M. raised a fleet of 20 ships & of them cutting at 7 double reef top fore top sail. light sails furled. the middle strong breeze tacked ship to get clear of the ice. The latter part fine pleasant weather ship under all sail ice and ship a plenty doing nothing
Lat. 63° 11' N. Long. 177° 26' W.

Sunday, June 22.

These 24 hours begins with light air and calms spoke ship Glabe. of N.B. one Whales the middle part moderate breeze from the South. the latter part strong winds from the same quarter. saw plenty of ships steering by the wind off and on. Saw no Whales.

Monday, June 23. S. J.

These 24 hours begins with fresh gales from the South. at 1 P.M. took in the light sail and put the ship under double reef top sail. at 8 P.M. tacked ship to the E. by S. close in with the ice. plenty of ships in all directions. The middle part more moderate. the latter part thick by spells. Saw nothing worth mention winds South.
Lat. 63° 31' N.

Tuesday, June 24.

These 24 hours begins with a moderate breeze from South to S.E. at 3 P.M. saw a whale going N.E. the weather thick by spells. at 5 P.M. tacked ship to the S.W. ship under all sail. the middle part continues much the same. the latter part light winds from the S.E. ship heading to the South. at 10 a.m. tacked the main yard for Whales at 4 p.m. hoisted 2 quarter masts. So ends 2 boats upon the
Lat. 63° 04' N. Long. 178° 38' W.

Wednesday, June 25.

These 24 hours begins with thick fog. Ship lying at anchor for Whales, at 5 P.M. hoisted foremast. Steered by the wind to the N.E. the middle part winds came to the S.W. the latter part thick by spells. saw several ships steering in all directions. Ship under all sail steering N.E. saw nothing like Whales. So ends
Lat. 63° 24' N. Long. 175° 00' W.

Thursday, June 26.

These 24 hours begins with moderate winds from the S.W. to West. Ship under all sail steering S by E. several ships in sight at 7 P.M. spoke ship Para of N.B. one Whales. his harpoon, recovered. the loss of the French ship 4 days on a sunken reef 10 miles South of St. Lawrence Island. The middle and latter part continues fine pleasant weather winds from the Westward. ship under all sail steering by the wind to the Northwards towards the ice at 10 a.m. ship into the ice. Saw no Whales tacked to the South at 4 p.m. tacked to the North. at 12 meridian steered E. N. E. with square yards. several ships in sight. So ends this day and page. Saw in light
Lat. 63° 25' N. Long. 174° 00' W.
