

Wednesday, July 30, A.D. 1851.

These 24 hours begins with strong gales from the N.E. ship under double reef top sails, steering S. by E. the weather and rain with a heavy sea on. At 5 P.M. some moderate at 6 set whole top sails, the middle part being on both in jib, and main sail, but the ship under double reef top sails. The latter part continues much the same weather thick and rainy, no other.

Thursday, July 31.

These 24 hours begins with fresh gales from the E.N.E. accompanied with thick rainy weather, and bad sea on. ship under double reef top sails, at 5 P.M. breaks away with little or no wind the middle part being on both in jib, and main sail, and rain. The latter part continues much the same. Saw nothing, ship under all sail steering by the wind N.E. Lat. 55° 50' N. Long 178° 30' E.

Friday, August 1.

This day, and month begins with thick breezy from the N.W. the weather dark and cloudy, ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.E. saw nothing. The middle part being on set double reef top sails. The latter part some gales from N.W. ship under single reef leading S. W. saw nothing. The weather squally. Lat. 55° 55' N. Long 178° 00'.

Saturday, August 2.

These 24 hours begins with fresh gales from the N.W. ship under single reef top sails. the weather squally at 2 double reef the top sails, at 3 P.M. in jib, and main sail, ship heading S. W. the middle part continues the same. the latter part some moderate to ship under whole top sail, steering by the wind. to the South. Saw plenty of fine flocks around. so ends. Lat. 55° 53' N.

Sunday, August 3.

These 24 hours begins with strong breezy from the N.W. ship under whole top sails, heading N. by E. at 6 P.M. lashed ship to the N. by the weather cloudy. The middle part quit moderate ship under all sail, at 1 P.M. lashed to 4. at 4 P.M. up N. by E. ends with light air from N.W. saw plenty of fine flocks. Lat. 54° 23' N. Long 174° 15' E.

Monday, Aug. 4, A.D. 1851.

These 24 hours begins with a light breeze from the N.W. ship under all possible sail steering by the wind to the N.W. saw plenty of account. The middle part windy unsteady. the latter part being from the N.W. ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.W. saw plenty of fine flocks around. so ends this day, Lat. by alt. 54° 45' N. Long 173° 25' E.

Tuesday, Aug. 5.

These 24 hours begins with moderate wind from the N.W. ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.W. the weather cloudy with passing fog squalls, at 6 P.M. quite clear, at 6 P.M. lashed ship to the N.W. the middle and latter part light baffling air from all quarters saw nothing. Lat. 55° 15' N.

Wednesday, Aug. 6.

These 24 hours begins with light air from the E.N.E. the weather cloudy. Saw nothing of account. the middle part windy from the N.W. the latter part being from the N.W. ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.W. Lat. 55° 50' N. Long 170° 50' E.

Thursday, Aug. 7.

These 24 hours begins with a strong breeze from the N.W. the weather squally with fog at 3 P.M. in the light sail, at 6 P.M. the middle part ship being from the N.W. the latter part windy from the N.W. ship under whole top sails, heading N. W. saw nothing. Lat. 55° 40' N. Long 168° 45'.

Friday, Aug. 8.

These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the N.W. the weather thick. The sea a blood red color at 4 P.M. double reef the top sails. the middle part light air and calm. the latter part continues the same. saw nothing. watches employed in ship duty, at 12 P.M. had a light breeze from the N.W. ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.W. ends with thick fog.

Lat. by alt. 58° 10' N. Long 167° 44' E.
