

Sunday, Dec. 7. a.d. 1851.

These 24 hours begins with a fine pleasant breeze from the N.E. Ship under all sail steering course S.E. by E. at 8 A.M. steered S.E. by E. & E. saw nothing. The middle and latter part continuing much the same the latter part squally with strong breeze from the N.E. W. Lat. 25° 41' N. Long. 118° 56' W.

Monday, Dec. 8.

These 24 hours begins with fine pleasant breeze from the N.E. Ship under all sail steering course S.E. by E. The middle and latter parts continued the same at 8 A.M. saw a sail on the weather beam, watching employed repairing sails, one sail in sight.

Meridian Lat. 24° 27' N.

Tuesday, Dec. 9.

These 24 hours begins with fine pleasant breeze from the N.E. Ship under all sail steering S.E. by E. watching employed as usual one sail in sight at 7 P.M. steered E. by S. & E. The middle part brisk breeze from the N.E. the latter part moderate breeze saw nothing. Lat. 23° 11' N. Long. 112° 04' W.

Wednesday, Dec. 10.

These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the N.E. Ship under all sail steering E. by S. and East. saw nothing of account, watching employed as usual. The middle part moderate breeze from the Northward. The latter part light air and calms at 6 A.M. saw the land bearing E. by E. distance 15 miles. The Chronometer 40 miles to the West by Cape St. Lucas. Lat. 22° 12' N. Long. 110° 04' W.

Thursday, Dec. 11.

These 24 hours begins with calms and light baffling wind from N.E. to N.W. Land in sight. The middle and latter part light baffling air and calms. saw a ship on the weather beam, also a hump back. So ends this day and page.

Lat. 21° 46' N. Long. 109° 14' W.

Friday, Dec. 12. a.d. 1851.

These 24 hours begins with light baffling winds from the N.E. to South. The middle and latter part wind from all points of the compass, accompanied with frequent showers of rain. saw nothing worth account. Lat. 21° 36' N. Long. 108° 31' W.

Saturday, Dec. 13.

this day commencing with light baffling winds from E. & E. boreal. the weather lowering. saw nothing. The middle part squally. The latter part continuing much the same winds from the E. & E. saw nothing. so ends. Lat. 20° 16' N. Long. 107° 32' W.

Sunday, Dec. 14.

These 24 hours begins with squally rainy weather wind from E. & E. to East. Ship under all sail steering by the wind to the S.E. the middle part baffling and rain in torrents. The latter part fine pleasant weather winds from the East. saw a large school of black fish. Lat. 19° 34' N. Long. 107° 18' W.

Monday, Dec. 15.

These 24 hours begins with light breeze from the East. Ship under all sail steering by the wind to the S.E. at 4 P.M. Tacked Ship to the E. & E. at 9 P.M. had a light breeze from the N.E. the middle part continuing the same. The latter part winds from the Northward. Lat. 18° 44' N. Long. 106° 04' W.

Tuesday, Dec. 16.

These 24 hours begins with fine pleasant breeze from the N.E. Ship under all possible sail steering E. by S. saw nothing. the middle part winds from the N.E. to the N.W. The latter part light air from the Westward saw nothing. Lat. 17° 54' N. Long. 104° 20' W.

Wednesday, Dec. 17.

These 24 hours begins with light air from the West. Ship under all sail steering E. by S. the middle part continuing the same. The latter part calm watching employed in ship's duty. saw the land bearing N. by E. at about 30 miles off. Lat. 17° 32' N. Long. 103° 32' W. Lunar 12 miles East.
