

Saturday Jan 10. 1852.

These 24 hours begins with a brisk breeze from the S. E. Ship under all sail steering S. W. at 7 took in the light sail. Saw nothing the weather cloudy. The middle part continuing the same. The latter part ship under all sail heading S. W. by W. saw nothing
Lat. 1° 13' N. Long. 101° 26' W.

Sunday Jan 11.

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from the S. E. at 4 P. M. wind south. Tacked ship to the E. S. E. saw nothing. at 11 P. M. Tacked to the S. W. The latter part continuing much the same. saw nothing.
Lat. 0° 42' N. Long. 103° 47' W.

Monday Jan 12.

This day commences with fine pleasant weather wind from the South. Ship under all sail heading S. W. at 7 P. M. Tacked ship to the Eastward. at 1 P. M. Tacked to the S. W. the latter part saw 2 hump backs so early watches employed as usual. by Lunar 104° 35' W.
Lat. 0° 26' N. Long. 104° 26' W.

Tuesday Jan 13.

These 24 hours begins with a fine breeze from the S. E. Ship under all sail heading S. W. by W. at 1 P. M. Tacked for Black fish. The middle part light air and calm. The latter part continuing the same. saw nothing.
Lat. 0° 46' N. Long. 105° 14' W.

Wednesday Jan 14.

These 24 hours begins with light air from the S. E. ship heading to the Southward. saw nothing. The middle and latter part winds S. E. at 7 a.m. Tacked for Black fish.
Lat. 1° 08' N. Long. 105° 01' W.

Thursday Jan 15.

These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the E. by S. the weather squally watches employed in ships deck. saw nothing at 10 a.m. took in the light sail. The middle and latter part squally with some rain. saw nothing of account
Lat. 1° 46' N. Long. 107° 01' W.

Friday Jan 16. 1852.

These 24 hours begins with moderate breeze from the E. S. E. Ship under all sail steering by the wind to the Southward at 4 P. M. took in the light sail. saw nothing of account. the weather squally. The middle and latter part continuing much after the old style. Ship heading S. by W.
Lat. 3° 24' S. Long. 107° 01' W.

Saturday Jan 17.

These 24 hours begins with brisk breeze from the E. S. E. Ship under all sail heading S. by W. saw nothing. at 6 P. M. took in the light sail. hauled up the courses. The middle and latter part brisk breeze from the S. E. Ship under all sail heading by the wind to the S. E. W. watches employed fitting a new main top sail.
Lat. 4° 51' S. Long. 107° 56' W.

Sunday Jan 18.

These 24 hours begins with a brisk breeze from the S. E. Ship under all sail heading S. S. W. saw nothing. at 6 P. M. put the ship under short sail. at 12 noon ship at 6 a.m. made sail. wore ship to the South at 7 saw sperm whales off the lee beam. at 8 loosed 3 boats. at 11 a.m. struck one of them to the waist boat at 12 got the whale alongside.

Monday Jan 19.

These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the E. S. E. all hands employed cutting sperm whale. at sun down tacked down. for the night part day light called all hands. commenced cutting. ends with strong breeze and engaged all hands employed cutting.

Tuesday Jan 20.

These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the E. S. E. at 8 P. M. finished cutting in. cleared up decks. set the watch. got the my words again the latter part strong breeze and rugged watches employed boiling and cutting up sperm whale junk. saw nothing.

Lat. 5° 04' S. Long. 109° 36' W.
