

Thursday, April, 20/52.

These 24 hours begins with fresh gales from the West, ship under short sail steering by the wind heading at 10. At 11 we were employed getting a new boat. The middle part winds from the N. N. W. ship under double reef top sails, steering by the wind. The latter part more moderate, wind from the S. W. ship under all sail steering at 10. At 11 we were employed in dunnage jobs.

Friday, April, 21.

These 24 hours begins with a brisk breeze from the S. W. ship under all sail steering at 10. At 11 we saw nothing, heavy swell coming from the Westward. The middle part continuing much the same. The latter part light air and calm. The weather thick? ship under all sail South, by act. 52° 31'. N.

Saturday, April, 22.

These 24 hours begins with light breeze from the S. W. ship under all sail steering at 10. At 11 we set double reef top sails. The weather thick and rainy. The middle and latter parts continuing much the same. Saw nothing watches employed in dunnage jobs about the ship. This day the observation.

Sunday, April, 23.

These 24 hours begins with thick weather winds from the S. W. ship under all sail steering at 10. At 11 we saw nothing. At 1 P.M. took in sail for the night. The middle part fresh gale from the S. W. The latter part ends with fine pleasant weather. At 11 a.m. saw a Right Whale, at 4 p.m. 11° took a quarter boat and chased him at Lat. 54° 36'. N. Long. 153° 25'. W.

Sunday, April, 24.

These 24 hours begins with light air from the Eastward with a heavy swell from the S. W. watches employed getting the mainst. Boat. at 4 P.M. put the boat on the cranes. at 5 a.m. set back in sail. The middle part winds light at 7 p.m. 4 a.m. called all hands set all sail steered by the wind. To the S. S. W. at 8 p.m. 7° took a boat for a Whale? Whale perceived the boat and set off. at 11. 10° blow strong put the ship under short sail. Lat. 54° 34'. N. Long. 153° 11'. W.

Sunday, April, 25. 52.

These 24 hours begins with strong gales from the S. W. ship under short heading. S. W. the weather, calm and frequent snow squalls. Thermometer ranges at 80°. Water 38°. Saw nothing, but took a blubber. The middle part blow strong. at 8° set double reef top sails. Steered by the wind. at 11° set whole top sail. at 12 a.m. calm with a heavy swell from the Westward. the observation.

Monday, April, 26.

These 24 hours begins with light air from the Westward at 2 a.m. wind came to the South. at 4 a.m. on at 6 commenced snowing took in sail heading W. S. W. saw nothing. The middle part blow strong. at 7 p.m. 4° set all sail steered by the wind to the Northward. at 7° saw a Right Whale going quick. at 8 saw another turned all 3 boats and chased. at 9 came on board at 11° saw a Whale off the lee beam fantailing. kept the ship off at 4 p.m. 11° begins to blow and snow put the ship under double reef top sail took in job and main sails. so ends this day.

Lat. 54° 16'. N. Long. 153° 34'. W.

Tuesday, April, 27.

These 24 hours begins with strong gale from the West, accompanied with snow squalls and a heavy sea from the S. W. at 2 P.M. went ship to the N. N. W. took in the fore top sail, at 7° closed reef the main top sail. The middle and latter parts continuing much the same. at 9 a.m. went ship to the S. W. saw nothing.

Wednesday, April, 28.

These 24 hours begins with strong breeze from the Westward and raised the weather very cold. ship under short sail. heading. S. W. at 6 P.M. saw a Right Whale off the lee bow. did not loose. The middle part more moderate. The latter part ship under all sail. at 8 a.m. saw a Right Whale going quick did not loose. at 10° saw an other whale going to the Northward faster than an steam engine the weather cloudy. and cold.
