

Thursday, April, 27, 1852.

These 24 hours begins with brisk breeze from the Westward ship under all sail steering by the wind to the N.W. at 3 P.M. breeze on and shifts in thick snow storm at 6 o'clock in sail. at 4 past 6 clears up and breeze over the middle and latter part blows a strong gale from West. to N.E. ship heading N.W.

Friday, April, 28.

this day begins with strong gale from the S.E.W. ship have too under close reef main top sail heading N.W. at 7 P.M. begins to moderate. wore ship to the S.E.W. the middle and latter part continues fresh gale with clear weather. saw 4 R. Whales. so rugged to loose for them Lat. 54° 44' N. Long 151° 25' W.

Saturday, May, 1, 1852.

These 24 hours begins with moderate gale from the Westward ship under short sail. at 3 P.M. saw several R. Whales. called all hands set a double reef to sails. loosed 2 boats and chased. at 6 came on board. at 7 took in sail for the night. the middle and latter part strong gale from the S.E.W. ship have too. No Observation.

Sunday, May, 2.

these 24 hours begins with moderate gale from the Southward ship under short sail. the middle part continues much the same. the latter part begins to moderate at 8 a.m. set double reef top sails. wore ship to the S.W. saw nothing of account. ends with strong gale and snow Lat. 54° 54' N. Long 151° 58' W.

Monday, May, 3.

these 24 hours begins with strong gale from the S.E.W. at 12 past 12 have too heading S.W. blowing and snowing a storm. the middle and latter part continues much the same. saw nothing worth remark. this day, no Observation.

Tuesday, May, 4, 1852.

these 24 hours begins with strong gale from the S.E.W. the weather thick and heavy sea on ship have too heading S.W. at 3 P.M. took in the waist boat. the middle part continues to blow heavy. from the S.E. the latter part more moderate saw 2 R. Whales. going to windward quick. ship under short sail Lat. 55° 05' N. Long 153° 13' W.

Wednesday, May, 5.

these 24 hours begins with brisk breeze from the S.E.W. accompanied with unsettled weather. at 3 P.M. took in ship. to the S.E. saw nothing. at 4 past 6 took in sail for the night the weather looks threatening. the middle part strong breeze. the latter part continues much the same. ship under whole top sails heading S.E. at 8 a.m. loosed for Whales at 7 bells came on board. Lat. 54° 42' N. Long 152° 42' W.

Thursday, May, 6.

these 24 hours begins with light baffling winds from S.E.W. at 1/2 past 1 P.M. loosed for a gam of Whales. harbour boat went on Whales perceived the boat and sailed. chased different Whales until 5 came on board winds from the S.E. and weather cleared. at 4 past 6 took in ship to the S.E. took in sail as usual. the middle and latter part continues much the same. at 8 a.m. lights up a little set all sail at 4 past 10 wind shifted to the Westward. at 11 loosed 2 quarter boats for a gam of Whales got close to the Whales came on to blow so hard. that we got on board just in time put the ship under a close reef main top sail. heading S.W. Lat. 54° 33' N. Long 152° 22' W.

Friday, May, 7.

these 24 hours begins with strong gale from the West. ship have too heading S.W. at 3 P.M. wore ship to the West. wind S.E.W. saw a Whale the weather begins to moderate. the middle part wind shifted to the S.E. accompanied with thick rainy weather and bad sea on at 7 a.m. wore ship to the N.E. at 11 took in the fore sail and waist boat. blowing heavy. ends
