

Barque Fortune of New Bedford Capt Hathaway

Remarks on Wednesday March 10th 1852

First and middle part fresh winds from N E and hazy weather ~~the~~ by the wind heading S E carrying Main S. J. sail out at Daylight wind shifted to Eastward No Kachue Ship to North at 1 P M Bill, Splice & Kings broke out with the small, Box Bill was very much out of his head, Burbanks, & Fay are sick complaining with the exception, the other three Tom, Tim and Peter some better at 7 o'clock and ~~ten~~ ^{thirty} minutes Philip Thomas the Cook that came from home ~~the~~ the Ship fell overboard we heard him hollow topped the Ship to the head and heard a Boat as quick as possible after looking some time for him we had to give him up lost, no one saw him fall over, but we supposed he fell over accidentally as this was nothing the matter with ^{him} to appearance So Ends this melancholy Days work

Remarks on Thursday March 11th

Came with strong breezes from S E and cloudy ~~the~~ at 8 middle part rainy at 7 P M took in the S. J. sail and the jib latter fresh gales from South and clear weather at 10 A M set the S. J. sail watch employed in Ship's duty Mate on duty again after being off thirty two Days Bill is very bad the others is some better Burbanks has broke out with small pox So Ends

Remarks on Friday March 12th

First and middle part fresh gales from South to N and squally rainy weather ~~the~~ at 4 P M double reefed the Top sails took in Main sail at Daylight wind shifted to Westward and cleared off turned reefs out of Top sails and main S. J. sail at 5 o'clock and thirty minutes Bill Splice Deed with small Pox 4 o'clock and thirty minutes P M we buried him he scented so we could not keep him, the sick ones some all of them So Ends we white washed the Forecastle

Remarks on Saturday March 13th

These 24 hours fresh gales from West to N and clear weather ~~the~~ at 6 P M with Top Gallant sails out at 6 P M double reefed Top sails at Daylight set them again watch employed in fitting a stop to the Bolsters So Ends invalids no better

Bound to Kamskatka A D 1852

Remarks on Saturday March 14th

These 24 hours baffling winds from West to N and cloudy weather ~~the~~ at 8 A M at Sundown took in the light sails Daylight set them again Fay on duty, invalids on the gain- ing hand So Ends

Long 158° 24

Remarks on Monday March 15th

First part moderate breezes from N W and cloudy weather ~~the~~ at 8 A M middle and latter baffling airs and calms and rainy weather ~~the~~ at 4 P M we passed a small Island and high land, So Ends, invalids little better

Lat 31° 57

Long 159° 50

Remarks on Tuesday March 16th

First part light baffling airs from North and thick rainy weather heading to Eastward at 8 P M wore ship at 7 wind cantled to N W we wore back to N E it burst up strong and stopped raining we took in the S. J. sail and double reefed the Top sails at Daylight turned reefs out of Top sails we saw small Island bearing N W dist 25 miles at 7 A M we saw another bearing N E dist 20 miles the wind shifted to N E in a squall we double reefed Top sails and perched the courses latter hard gales and squally at 9 wore ship heading up N W So Ends Kings is very bad, the others giving better

Remarks on Wednesday March 17th

First part hard gales from N E and squally rainy weather heading N W under double reef Top sails middle part abated some we set courses

wind cantled to Eastward at 6 P M wore ship to Southward latter heavy gales from S E thick and rainy weather ~~the~~ by the wind with S. J. sails aboard we took in the Main sail and Fore Top sail So Ends with hard Sea on, at 5 o'clock Kings died with small Pox at 8 o'clock we buried him ~~below~~ ^{below} deck

Remarks on Thursday March 18th

First part hard gales from S E and rainy lying to on the rocks under closed reefed Main Top sail & Fore sail at 4 P M wind shifted to Westward and moderated we turned back at 8 A M wind shifted to North latter heavy gales and hard squalls bore her to on the rocks under closed the S. J. sail and Spencers So Ends
