

Remarks Abroad Brig F A Barstow

Wednesday June 8 1892.
Working to the N.E. foggy, calm,
wind N.W., all day.

Thursday June 9, 1892.
Working to the N.E. Keep off at
four A.M. South. at seven luffed to
Wales - and stood to the Eastward.
At eight P.M. keep off South -
St Lawrence Island in sight. S.W.

Friday June 10 1892.
Steering W by S. at seven A.M. anchored
of N.E. Cape. St J. at eleven with
our anchor and steered west by S.
Throng huge fur the North.

Saturday June 11 1892.
A.M. Steering various courses around the
Island P.M. by the wind, working up
to the Sand Spit. All well.

Sunday June 12 1892.
A.M. Foggy with N.E. vessels in heavy
ice on the Northern tack under all sail.
at nine A.M. tacked ship and stood
through a strip of ice and made the land
stood close in 12 fathoms. tack to the North
and anchored at about seven P.M.
the schooner Roscoe is here reports fleet of
sails vessels as having taken 4 whales Helinman
1. Roscoe 2. Barstow 1. Natives came on board.

Monday June 13 1892.
At nine A.M. took our anchor and
run to the south about the Island
fog seen P.M. calm Island eight miles
off. Third Mate off duty. sick.

Tuesday June 14 1892.
A.M. light air & Calm Hands at ship
duty. Made a mast coat and filled it.
Third Mate off duty. Course S.S.E.

Wednesday June 15 1892.
A.M. Wind East course S.S.E. a good
breeze Third mate came on duty this
evening all well.

Thursday June 16 1892.
Brig on the wind heading just clear
of Cape upright. St Mathews Island.
fog & rain. course S.E. wind East.

Friday June 17 1892.
Wind light. fog & squalls. P.M. Calm
at eight P.M. got a breeze worked to
the South east - during the night.

Saturday June 18 1892
Working to the S.E. under all sail
hauled out foot-cask and put in some
natives boots. Lat 59 = 16.

Sunday June 19 1892
Light wind & Calm. caught a few
cod fish working to the S.E. under all sail
So ends
