

Remarks onboard Brig F. A. Bastow

Monday June 20 1892.
A.M. foggy & clear. At three A.M. hauled up our boom and commenced to scrape. finished scraping at noon. P.M. washed down the decks and hauled out sail cask cut our an old middle stay sail and made a fore-stay-sail weather clear wind East & N.E.

Tuesday June 21 1892.
A.M. fog & rain strong breeze from the eastward. P.M. wind moderating at seven o'clock calm went to fishing & caught 57 codfish. fog.

Wednesday June 22 1892.
A.M. Fishing wind west very light at five keep off east-north-east fog. P.M. clear with fog squalls & rain. Hands employed cutting out a fore upper-top-gall-sail. salted one barrel of codfish "all well".

Fog & rain, Mate off duty sick, working to the S.W.

Fog & Rain, Mate off duty sick. working to S.W.

Saturday June 25 1892.
A.M. Rose tried wright. whals. lowered boats and struck one & got him to Starboard Boat; finished cutting at ten o'clock P.M. sent the watch below.

Lat 56.10. Long 168 45.

Sunday June 26 1892
A.M. Hands busy clearing up decks saw "fin backs" "hump backs" "killers" & "cow fish" wind to the Northward.

Monday June 27. 1892.
At ten o'clock lowered for a wright. Whale chased him for 10 hours did not get him came on board at seven P.M. St Georges Island in sight about 18 miles off.

Tuesday June 28.
Weather fine wind N.W. saw a few fin backs. & an carcass the Island in sight. lowered a boat to see if we could not get a piece of throat bone out of the stinker but did not succeed to end.

Wednesday June 29.
At day sight a ship on our weather bow proved to be the Helen Mar. bound for Amalaska. Brought by the wind on the port tack at half past eight were ship and run to the S.W.
