Wednesday Feb 15th
Commenced with fine weather all hands employed
in stowing down at 6 PM finished stowing head
set the watch middle parts rigged at day
light commenced stowing in the fore hole. Latter
parts rigged nothing in sight so ends this day
stowing down Lat by Obs Low 254

Thursday Feb 17th
Commenced with rugged weather all hands
employed in stowing down 4 sail in sight
at 6 PM finished stowing oil, middle parts
rigged at day light stowed off the fore hole
all hands employed in washing off at 12 M
finished so ends this day nothing in sight
Sunday Feb 18th 255

Commenced with fine weather all hands employed
in washing middle parts rigged at daylight 2
sail in sight. Latter parts same no whales in sight
So ends this day Lat by Obs 45° 45' Low 256
Monday Feb 19th

Commenced with fine weather 4 sail in sight the
Walter Scott, 8, mariner of Nantucket, 8 bark Columbus
of New Bedford, at 12 PM spoke the mariner
5 months out, no oil at dusk gamming with her
8, the Walter Scott middle parts fine at 7 PM sent the
fly 1 lb. 8, repaired it so ends this day 2 sail in sight
Lat by Obs Low 257

Tuesday Feb 20th
Commenced with fine breezes and light showers of rain
the watch employed 2 sail in sight middle parts
squally took main sail double reefed the topsails, at
day light made sail one sail in sight. Latter parts
raining so ends this day, nothing in sight
Lat by Obs Low 258

Ship George 8 1/2 months out 350 barrels 258

45 Off Shore Ground Lat 42 S. Low
Wednesday 22nd

Commenced with fine breezes square yards steering S by W
nothing in sight at sunset double reefed the topsails, took
in fore & main sail, middle parts squally with rain
at day light made sail heading S. S. W. one sail in sight
at 18 AM spoke her the usual Howland of New Bedford
19 months out 2,350 lb. Latter parts fine so ends this day
in company with the ship Lat by Obs 44° 59' Low 259

Thursday 23rd
Commenced with fine and rainy, drizzly weather ship
Isaac Howland in company, middle parts fine with
light squalls of rain, at daylight the Isaac off the
lee bow steering to the S. W. under whole topsails, at
10 AM square yards, raised a school of whales off
the harbour beam, lowered 3 boats, did not get fast
came on board at 1/2 past 12 M so ends this day Ship
Isaac Howland in company Lat by Obs 260

Friday 24th
Commenced with fine weather the watch employed
middle squally with rain, at daylight 2 sail in sight
tacked to the S. W. at 8 AM saw the ships tower for
whales, tacked for them at 11 AM lowered 2 boats whales
going quick to Nindawawa, at 12 M spoke the Cyrus
of Nantucket 5 1/2 months out 70 lb, the Isaac Howland
in company so ends this day Lat Low 261

Saturday 25th
Commenced with fine weather gamming another
sail in sight at 1/2 past 2 spoke her the Walter Scott
10. Oil, middle parts fine breezes steering west, at day
light luffed to the wind with tarboard tacks
aboard nothing in sight, latter parts fine nothing
in sight so ends this day Lat by Obs 266

Sunday 26th
Commenced with fine weather nothing in sight
middle parts squally, under double reefed topsails
heading to the Eastward at day light tacked nothing
in sight. Latter parts fine at 12 squared yards
heading N. W. W. so ends this day 263
Lat by Obs 5° 30 S Low
