

offered North and the Officers of Sassy
Harbour Capt. on the 2nd at sunrise
saw land on our weather Bow and
hauled up for it in the afternoon our
boat went on shore and returned without
any thing the next morning at sunrise
we came to anchor under the west end
of the Island of Onee-bee here were
two English Ships lying the Princess
Mary and Indispensable of both of
London they came to here last night
on the 6th got off 10 Bannels of yam
and potatoes and in the afternoon took our
anchor and proceeded to sea in company
with the above mentioned ships the 3rd
day stored the benches and cleared the
decks for whale. Nothing worth remark-
ing until the 30 when we saw land
early in the morning and in the
afternoon our boat went on shore
on the Island of Almaga one of the
Sadrone Islands and returned loaded
with coconuts and wood the Marcus
and Rambler still in company the
1st and 2nd spent in getting of wood and

two boat loads of coconuts the ship
saying off and on at night put to sea
the land is high and mountainous and
of which is on fire the soil is good
being covered with a thick foliage in
many places there is groves of coconuts
of many Acres the water is so deep
near shore that the ship passed and re-
passed so near shore that we could
hear the birds sing on the land the
next day passed several Islands and on
the 9th got 1 large whale and the 10th
got another one the 16th got 1 more to
the Starboard Boat on the 23rd got one
whale to the Bow Boat and got the
Starboard Boat stove by the gear and
two men knocked aboard and on
the 25th lowered and got 4 whales
with 3 boats from this time until
the 6th of June the weather raged and
squally so much so that we did not
keep most heads more than half of the
time this day 2 of the crew James
Smith and Peter Plate having some
dispute about some money that
