Lat 35° 58' South
Sun day the 1 1824	The first part of these 24 hours a Gale of wind from the S.E. at 6 P.M. wore ship to the Eastward the afterpart Moderate weather at 11 Set the top sails and at 5 P.M. took in sail and wore ship Lat 37° 24'	Mon day the 2 1824	These 24 hours Clear and pleasant with a Light Breeze from the Southward at 3 P.M. made sail and at 6 tacked ship to the Eastward at 4 P.M. wore ship to the westward Lat 35° 52' South
Tues day the 3 1824	The first part of these 24 hours Light winds and Clear weather the Middle part Calm and rainy at 6 P.M. made sail and wore ship at 7 saw a shoal of black fish and lowered one boat But got none the watch employed in mending the gill the afterpart squally at 4 P.M. took in sail Lat 37° 10' South	Wed day the 4 1824	These 24 hours Light winds and pleasant weather at 11 A.M. the Capt of the Loper came on board of us and spent the day the watch employed in picking oakum Lat 35° 47'
