

July 13 1852

The weather commences with light winds from the N. heading Southerly by the wind saw nothing this day end with light wind Lat 30° 15' N Long 54° 43' W

Wednesday the 14

Commence with light variable wind heading Eastward saw one peack of squid when employed in ships duty such as cooping Carpendising Grinding Spades bording knife Lat 30° 33' N Long 54° 55' W

Thursday the 15 This day commences with Light winds N. employed in ships duty the Day continues fine with the occasion of 2 squalls. Of rain saw Blackfish Porpoises Lat 30° 52' N Long 55° 12' W

Friday the 16 Commences with light breeze from the southerly wind in the after part of the Day spoke the Schooner of Westport had see nothing since we saw her last the Day ends with fine weather Lat 32° 2' N Long 56° 35' W

Saturday the 17 1852

Commences with light and variable wind in the afternoon saw a spout but no one knew what they were saw several sails during the day Lat 31° 58' N Long 56° 39' W

July 18 1852 Sunday the 18

commences with light breeze attended with light rain squalls broke out for water the latter part of the day had fine weather heading Southerly with Easterly wind saw one sail Lat 31° 12' N Long 56° 22' W

Monday the 19

at 1/2 past 12 P.M. tacked ship heading N. & Easterly with moderate gales from the Eastwardly the latter part of the day moderated at 1/2 past 11 A.M. spoke the Schooner Alfred of New Bedford Gifford 5 weeks out 50 sperm

Lat 31° 40' N Long 56° 20' W

Tuesday the 20

commences with light Easterly breeze saw Killers and a sail the day ends with a light Easterly wind Lat 32° 30' N

Wednesday the 21

Commences with a light Eastward wind haul gradually to the southe the latter part of the Day the breeze increase heading E. & E saw breeches Thursday the 22 commences with light Breezes the latter part of the day squalls of win and rain Lat 32° 35' N Long 57° 13' W
